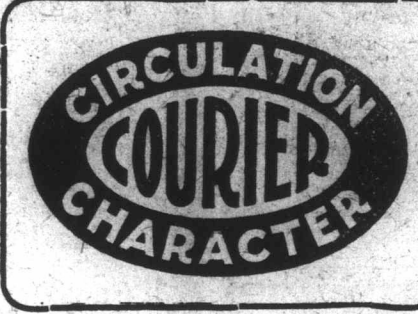

## IMPROVING CEMETERIES

### Buildings and Grounds Committee Takes Action to Solve Problems

Measures tending to bring considerable improvement in the condition of the city's cemeteries were recommended by the buildings and grounds committee to the city council last night, and endorsed by the latter body. The changes made include an increase in the price of lots in the southern half of Mount Hope cemetery, in order to encourage the purchase of northerly lots.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee submitted the following report:

1. That tenders be called for a new wire fence for Greenwood Cemetery on West street.
2. That the men working in the cemetery be paid as follows: The foundation-men to receive 37 cents per hour and the other men to receive 35 cents per hour.
3. Also that a book be purchased for keeping records of Mount Hope Cemetery.
4. That all parties wishing their grass cut by the superintendent to be charged the following scale: Full lot \$2.00 per season, half lot \$1.00 per season.
5. Lots in Greenwood Cemetery to remain at same price: full lot \$100.00, half lot \$60.00.
6. Mount Hope Cemetery, southern half, full lot to be raised to \$60.00, half lot to be raised to \$30.00, north of Mount Hope to remain the same, full lot \$40.00, half lot \$20.00. Also a section to be reserved for lots of 3 graves to be sold for \$16.00.
7. That a second hand safe be purchased for Greenwood Cemetery to keep all books in, for the sum of \$28.00.
8. That 30 cents per foot be charged for all foundations being put in the cemetery after July 1st next.
9. It shall be the duty of the superintendent to see that all lots purchased shall be graded to a uniform level and satisfactory to the superintendent and all markers shall be level with the sod, also concrete posts, no posts to be less than 5 inches square.
10. And that a contingent fund be created, 50 per cent. of the revenue applying to the same to be used for maintenance purposes only.
11. That the cemetery be uniformly and repaired as soon as finances will permit.
12. We also recommend that the City Engineer survey certain dead roads in Greenwood cemetery, and lay them out for sale as burial plots.
13. That the Engineer also furnish blue prints and plans of Mount Hope Cemetery.
14. All parties attending theatres must park their cars on the Market Square and not leave them on the streets.
15. That the trimming of the trees on boulevards be handed over to the Parks Board and that the said Board be asked to furnish this Council with an estimate of the amount of money required for this purpose.

**In Explanation**

Ald. Montgomery inquired whether the council had power to transfer control of the city trees to the Parks Board, and whether they would take over the control.

Ald. Briggs replied in the affirmative to both questions, stating that the Parks Board had asked that they be given control of the trees.

Ald. Hays explained that the parking of cars on the market square would relieve congestion on Dalhousie street. A man appointed by the police department would watch the cars for a small fee from each owner.

Ald. Burrows inquired why the city should not get the revenue thus accruing.

Ald. Briggs replied that he did not wish to see the city held responsible for any damage which might be done.

Ald. Symons inquired concerning the increased charges for cemetery lots.

Ald. Briggs in reply stated that the cemeteries to-day were not self-sustaining, and that a contingent fund must be established to maintain the cemeteries when they became filled. The price for lots in only the front half of the cemeteries had been raised, in order to induce citizens to purchase lots farther back.

"What is the need of making people go to the far part of the cemetery until the better part is full?" demanded Ald. Symons. He thought there was discrimination against the poor man.

Ald. Briggs replied that persons who could afford it were now buying lots which they did not need at yet and that under this plan all would receive fair treatment.

"Brantford's cemeteries are the most successful in Ontario," declared Ald. Hill, supporting the plan of the buildings and grounds committee for the establishment of a contingent fund.

The report carried.
