What is "A Dollar Ten?"

"Give them military pay!" That cry has been heard frequently from farmers and other employers with respect to essential laboring men. By "military pay" they mean \$1.10 a day. Military pay is considerably more than these employers realize. Let us suppose a case. The pay of a married private in the Canadian army is \$401.50 a year. His wife gets a separation allowance of \$300 and probably \$120 from the Patriotic Fund. This is for the family \$821.50. The soldier gets his board, worth at least \$200 a year. He gets two suits of clothes and an outfit, including blankets, which is perhaps worth \$100. Certainly he would spend that much annually if he were as well dressed as a civilian as he is while in the army. Thus his income is equivalent to \$1100 a year—not counting free hospital accommodation in case of illness, with free medical treatment. There are 300 working days in a year. A laborer who was receiving no better than "military pay" would require almost \$3.75 a day from the farmer or other employer who accepted his services.—Toronto News
