FACTS FROM OWEN SOUND

The letter of the Mayor of Ower Sound published in the Toronto News recently has raised a storm, of indignation, and the following paragraphs are from a circular sent out as an answe to his statements :-

UNDER LOCAL OPTION Excise on liquors entered for con umption has decreased 45 per cent. Eaton's brewery has been out of ousiness, so far as the making of beer is concerned, since the advent of Local

Four former license holders have lett town—evidently satisfied that Owen Sound is not a promising field

Hotel accommodation is good. Meals are excellent.

Pauperism is on the decrease In 1905, for 11 months under license, the town spent \$789.21 to help the poor.

For 11 months under Local Option

the amount spent in 1907 was \$431.20 or a decrease of \$358.01. Increase in the postal revenue at the Owen Sound office is 10 per cent.

The premises of the former liquor stores are vacated and otherwise en ployed. No church organization is reported as languishing because of the removal of the licensed bar.

"Local trade continues to have very satisfactory ring about it." - Owen Sound Times, Nov. 21, 1907.

"Only this week three prominent merchants, in general conversation, stated that their business had largely increased."-Owen Sound Sun, Dec. 17, 1907.

The president of the Owen Sound Board of Trade, in his annual address said : "Our general business has been satisfactory; our factories have run full time during the season; our trade has improved immensely in the West. Our local exports have exceeded all

former years." Commenting on the Mayor's letter, the Owen Sound Sun of Dec. 12, 1907, says: "We do not know what was wrong with the Mayor when he wrote the stuff; how any man could spin off such a yarn—and expect it to be believed—passes comprehension."
