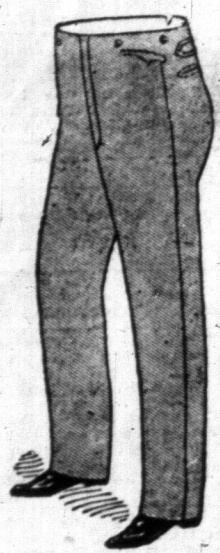

CONSERVATIVE SWEEP

English Liberals are Being Overwhelmed in the Elections.

HOW THEY STAND.

Ministerialists..... 280
Liberals including Laborites..... 72
Nationalists..... 45

London, Oct. 5, 4 a. m.—The "khaki" boom has swept the country. At midnight returns received showed the total number of elected to be 397, with the relative strength of the parties as follows:

Ministerialists, 280; Liberals, including laborites, 72; Nationalists, 45. The Conservatives have gained altogether 21 seats, and the Liberals 14. The Daily Mail describes the elections as "the rout of the pro-Boers," and "the debacle of little Englandism." Yesterday's pollings are a tale of increased ministerialist and diminished Liberal majorities. The workingmen of the country have replied in a very decided voice in favor of the war and of the annexation of the republics. Even Liberal Scotland is at last feeling the fall force of the shock, the Glasgow Tories being as much astonished as the Liberals at their unexpected success in

winning two seats. Andrew Dryburgh Provand, who was defeated in the Blackfriars division, had sat for Glasgow in the Liberal interests since 1886, and the Bridgeton division was Sir Geo. Otto Trevelyan's seat. Both had long been Liberal strongholds. The results in Liverpool and other industrial districts tell a similar story of increased unionist majorities. Mr. Chamberlain, who was listening to the results over the telephone, sent the following message to the people of Birmingham: "This has been a good day's work for the empire." London itself felt the full tide of the Unionist victory. The Liberal report from the metropolis will not amount to more than seven or eight out of 62 members. Indeed, the isolated Liberal successes only serve to enhance the sweeping nature of the Unionist triumph. In all directions the anti-war candidates have been defeated. Even Mr. Cremer's success at Haggerston, is doubtful, as a recount has been demanded.

GERMANY'S FIRM.

Determined on the Proper Punishment of Chinese Offenders.

The Kaiser Issues Another Note to the Powers.

Berlin, Oct. 5.—An official of the Foreign Office informs the correspondent of the Associated Press that Germany is issuing a second note to the powers regarding the punishment of the Emperor of China, Prince Tuan and others. The text of the note of the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Count Von Bulow, to the powers is as follows: "The Imperial Government is informed of an edict of the Chinese Emperor by which the total of Shanghai, where the punishment is ordered of a number of princes and dignitaries named for having supported the Boxers. The Imperial Government assumes that all the other cabinets concerned have received a similar communication. According to the authenticity of the edict, on which we, for our part, do not wish to cast the contrary, we can perceive in it the first sign towards a practical basis for the re-establishment of an orderly state of things in China. The Imperial Government, therefore, proposes that the powers come to an agreement to instruct their diplomatic representatives in China to examine and give their opinion on the following points: "First—Whether the list contained in the edict of persons to be punished is sufficient and correct. "Second—Whether the punishments proposed meet the case. "Third—In what way the powers can control the carrying out of the penalties imposed. "The information received up to the present concerning the reception of this proposal by the powers justifies the belief that a general understanding on this matter may be looked for."

STOPPED BY DEATH.

A Daring Hold-up Foiled by the Shot of the Express Messenger.

Council Bluffs, Iowa, Oct. 5.—Lying at the morgue in this city with a bullet through his heart is the body of a powerfully built man, with black hair and mustache, about 6 feet tall, and aged apparently 45 years. He was one of two men who held up the Kansas City passenger train on the Burlington road three miles south of this city at midnight. Express Messenger Chas. Baxter killed him. The two men boarded the train at Union Pacific transfer, and climbed over the tender just as the train was crossing the Mosquito Creek bridge. Engineer Donnelly and Frank Holman, fireman, who were in charge of the engine, were ordered to stop up as soon as the train had crossed the bridge. While one man held a revolver on the engine crew his companion went back and cut off the baggage and mail cars, leaving the day coaches and sleepers standing on the main line. Acting under orders, the engineer pulled the train half a mile down the track, where a stop was made. Here the robbers approached the express car and ordered Messenger Baxter to open the door. He refused to do so. Under compulsion, Engineer Donnelly attached a stick of dynamite to the side door of the car and blew it open. In the meantime Messenger Baxter seized his gun and escaped from the door on the opposite side of the car, as soon as the door was opened one of the robbers entered the car while his companion marauded the engineer and fireman back to the engine. Baxter crept around in front of the engine, and seeing the robber keeping guard over the engine crew, fired one shot and killed him instantly. As soon as the shot was heard the robber in the car jumped to the ground and fled through a cornfield. The dead man was brought to this city. Nothing was found on it by which could be identified. The robber inside the car was preparing to blow the safe at the time his companion was killed.

SUICIDE AT RODNEY.

A Young Woman Takes a Dose of Rat Poison.

Rodney, Ont., Oct. 4.—Miss Lena Dubs, a domestic, committed suicide by poisoning herself on the 8th Con. Alboro, near Rodney. The deceased had been in the employ of a farmer near Duart, but had left there recently to visit her people and other acquaintances near Rodney. For some time it appears she had been looking forward with a view to securing a home of her own, but prospects not brightening in that direction, she grew despondent and threatened to poison herself. Not being able to secure the poison she returned to where she had been employed and got some there, which had been used for poisoning rats, returning with it to Mr. Geo. Bennett's. While there she went to the barn in the afternoon and took the poison. Coming out she met Mrs. Bennett and told her she had taken strychnine. She said it so carelessly that for a time the family did not believe her. After a time, however, it was thought advisable to send for a doctor. Dr. Dorland, of Rodney was sent for, but on reaching there he found it too late to accomplish anything toward saving the unfortunate woman's life. County Crown Attorney Donahue was communicated with, but it was not deemed necessary to hold an inquest. The deceased was 25 years of age and a daughter of Adam Dubs, of Aldboro.
