FINGER NAIL PHOTOGRAPHS.

The Latest Fad in England of Brides and Engaged Girls.

Photography on the finger nail is the latest fad in London society. It is an odd extension of the craze for photographic buttons and lockets, which have enjoyed such great popularity of late.

The idea is absolutely novel, and is being adopted by men and women alike. It is considered quite correct in some circles for a young bride to bear a portrait of her husband on the nail of her wedding ring finger. A number of engaged girls also have chosen this quaint method of keeping the features of their fiancés in a position where they can glance at them at all hours of the day.

"It is quite a simple matter to secure finger nail photographs," said a well known photographer. "It is best done by what is known as the carbon process."

"A photograph of the subject is first made in the ordinary way, and reduced to a size suitable for the finger nail. A print is then made from the negative on carbon paper, which is placed in a special frame. The photograph is then placed on the finger nail. When dry, the transfer paper is stripped off and a finished photograph is left on the finger nail."

"Finally, a thin coat of transparent enamel is brushed over the photograph, rendering it perfectly safe to wash the hand without damaging the picture."

"On the average person the photograph is partially destroyed by the cutting away of the nail in about three weeks. As the cost of each finger nail photograph is half a guinea, it becomes an expensive luxury if continued for a year."

"How to be Friendly With Wasps." A correspondent of the Leeds (England) Mercury bears testimony to the inoffensive behavior of wasps if not molested. He writes: "My favorite garden seat in summer is near an extensive beehive and evergreens. The wasps come to this bed while I am reading, roam over my book or newspaper. My hands and face are at their own pleasure. If I have been eating or drinking anything sweet they make free with my lips and cheek. They come and go peaceably, and I encourage their companionship by keeping perfectly still. I was never stung by a wasp but once in my life, and that I deserved the punishment, which I provoked. THE OLDEST OBELISK.

It Stands On the Banks of the Nile Not Far From Cairo.

The oldest of all the obelisks is the beautiful one of rosy granite which stands alone among the green fields on the banks of the Nile not far from Cairo. It is the gravestone of a great city which has vanished and left only this relic behind. That city was Bethshemes of Scripture, the famous On, which is memorable to all Bible readers as the residence of the priest of On, Potipher, whose daughter Asenath Joseph married. The Greeks called it Helopolis, the city of the sun, because there the worship of the sun had its chief centre and its most sacred shrine. It was the seat of the most ancient university in the world, to which youthful students came from all parts of the world to learn the occult wisdom which the priests of On alone could teach.

Thales, Solon, Eudoxus, Pythagoras and Plato all studied there; perhaps Moses too. It was also the birthplace of the sacred literature of Egypt, where a number of the oldest books in the world, generally known as "The Book of the Dead," giving a most striking account of the conflicts and triumphs of the life after death, a whole copy or fragment of which every Egyptian, rich or poor, wished to have buried with him in his coffin and portions of which are found inscribed on every mummy case and on the walls of every tomb. In front of one of the principal temples of the sun in this magnificent city stood, along with a companion long since destroyed, the solitary obelisk which we now behold on the spot. It alone has survived the wreck of all the glory of the place. It was constructed by User-tesen I., who is supposed to have reigned 2800 B. C., and has outlived all the dynastic changes of the land and still stands where it originally stood nearly forty-seven centuries ago. What appears of its shaft above ground is sixty-eight feet in height, but its base is buried in the mud of the Nile, and year after year the inundation of the river deposits its film of soil around its foot and buries it still deeper in its sacred grave.—Pall Mall Gazette.

Fooling a Scientific Man.

The Belgians once succeeded in getting cut rates on an operation from Sir Morell Macdonell. He engaged to attend a case at Antwerp. When he landed he was met by three men in mourning, who informed him that the patient had died, but that they would pay his fee.

Figures have recently been issued from various gold producing centres throughout the world, giving the values of the output for those districts for the past year, and in the aggregate the result is the largest production of which there is any record as follows:—

The total for 1904 was £69,888,000. There is thus an increase in the value of the output of nearly six millions sterling, the principal factor in which is an advance of 4-3-4 millions in the Transvaal figures. Canada exhibits a falling off, owing to the exhaustion of the Yukon placers.—Lloyd's Weekly Newspaper.

Value of Trading In Your Own Town.

A right that belongs to every citizen is the privilege of spending his earnings in whatever manner and where he wishes as long as he keeps within the law. No one will dispute the farmer's claim that he can send his money to any place that he wishes and buy goods he needs wherever he wants to. But there is an economic side of the question that should not be overlooked, says D. M. Carr in Home Trade Advocate. The resident of a community should be active in furthering the interests of the place he calls home. He is working contrarily to his own good when he sends his money to the distant city for supplies he knows can be secured in his home town. The dollar sent away goes out of circulation and ceases to be a factor in the building up of the community from which it is sent.

Feeding Consumptives.

The importance of wholesome food in combating tuberculosis is dwelt upon in the Dietetic and Hygienic Gazette in the following words: "Many people owe to dyspepsia the lowered vitality which made possible the successful tubercular infection. While we plead for good tenements, while we strive to control the infection of air and dust, and demand the destruction of all sputum of all infected people in a community, let us bear in mind that people not yet infected and people in whom infection has occurred, but is held in check by present physical vigor, need from every hygienical consideration of tuberculous patients, the care of the digestive system, and for this purpose, good cooks are better than druggists."
