Prospects Good for Flight to Indian Harbor To-day

REICHSTAG WILL ENDORSE DAWE'S PLAN

BERLIN, Aug. 29.—The final vote on the Government's Bills, necessary to carry out Germany's part of the Dawes Reparation programme, will be taken at four o'clock this afternoon, and it now appears certain that the Reichstag will endorse it.

PRINCE OF WALES ARRIVES AT NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The Prince of Wales arrived on the liner Berengaria at quarantine, Lower New York harbour, at 2.17 o'clock this afternoon.

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 29.—Checks totalling \$112,000 were taken from two Northward National Bank messengers early to-day at Broad and Lombard Streets by four armed bandits who escaped.

UNABLE TO SEND RELIEF PLANE

OTTAWA, Aug. 29.—Owing to the lack of bases in the north it is feared that the air board will be unable to send a relief plane to the Hudson Bay boat Lady Kindersley, drifting in the ice near Point Barrow, Alaska. The nearest plane is at Prince Rupert. The Hudson Bay Company had requested assistance by airplane.

NOVA SCOTIA'S TOLL OF THE SEA

HALIFAX, August 29.—Two Lunenburg fishing schooners arriving in their home ports today with flags at half mast out of respect for two of their crew who were drowned on Tuesday night, making the death list of nine off the Nova Scotian Coast during the recent hurricane. The other deaths were off Prospect, where six men were drowned, when the tern schooner Anna MacDonald was wrecked, and off Yarmouth, where one fisherman was drowned. Fears that the death toll may be still greater are entertained, as many of the fishing craft out of Lunenburg are believed to have been in the path of the awful storm.

LEOPOLD AND LOEB MAINTAIN BLASE AIR

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—John P. Cavery, retiring Chief Justice of Criminal Courts of Cook County, took full charge yesterday of the fate of Nathan F. Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb, student sons of millionaire fathers, and confessed kidnapers and murderers of Robert Franks. He sent September 10th, as the date on which he will announce the penalty for the crime. "While the public is showing itself unusually interested in the question of the penalty to be meted out to Loeb and Leopold, the two who should be most concerned maintain the blasé, bored air that has characterized them since the beginning of the trial. In their cells in the County Jail Babo and Dickie were as cheerful as if they had been taking part in a campus social affair, the former even joked about the possibility of being hanged. If I am hanged, Leopold said, it will be a rare occasion. Clarence Darrow's Roman holiday will be completely eclipsed. I will arrange to have a good jazz band on hand and plenty of hard punch. I am planning a last supreme shock for the world in the form of my farewell speech. I may be over-rating myself but I really think I can make it worth anyone's while who is fortunate enough to obtain an invitation. Loeb said, I am glad the trial is over. I will have more opportunity to make a name for myself in the jail baseball league.

CHINA ON BRINK OF CIVIL CONFLICT

SHANGHAI, Aug. 29.—Sparks lighting all China in open war were seen to-day in the impending conflict in the eastern portions of Kiangsu province in which Chi Shien Yuan, the aggressor, expects to drive out his rival Lin Yung Hisang Tschun of Chekiang Province.

FRENCH EVACUATION OF RUHR BEGINS

PARIS, Aug. 30.—The French government will order the evacuation of Dortmund in the Ruhr tomorrow, this is execution of Premier Herriot's engagement that the evacuation of the Ruhr would begin the day after the signing of the London agreement. The agreement was signed in London early this morning.

THE REPARATION PACT SIGNED

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Reparations, the pact drawn up at the recent international conference, outlining ways and means of putting the Dawes reparation programme into effect, was signed by representatives of the various nations early this afternoon.

SWEEP OVERBOARD IN TUESDAY'S GALE

LUNENBURG, N.S., Aug. 30.—Gordon Tanner of Stone House, and Horace Smith of Martin's River, were drowned on Tuesday night during the hurricane that swept the coast of Nova Scotia, according to tidings brought here today when schooners to which they belonged came into port with their flags at half mast. Tanner was swept overboard from the Maria Spindler some distance off Sable Island; Capt. Spindler and another member of the crew had a narrow escape from a similar fate. Hiltz was lost from the schooner Jean Smith while off the Banks. Both boats were badly battered in the heavy seas. The Spindler lost two of her dories and had her main gaff broken, while the Smith lost her cable and suffered other damage. The crews of the two vessels report their recent experience as worst they ever passed through.

REICHSTAG RATIFIES LONDON AGREEMENT

BERLIN, August 30.—The turnabout by forty-eight German Nationalist Reichstag Deputies late this afternoon, gave the Marx-Stresemann Government a comfortable majority in favor of the London Reparations Agreement. The sensational flop by the Reactionists was ostentatiously concealed up to the time balloting on the Railway Bill began, both the bank and debenture laws having previously been adopted by rising votes.

Erik Nelson having a clear pathway across the North Atlantic Ocean from Greenland to Labrador, if they decided to hop off this morning appeared good weather conditions, said that if the round-the-world fliers decided to take off this morning they would be received in Indian Harbor in fair weather. Nothing was heard from Lieut. Smith last night as to any further postponement in the flight.
