POLICE COURT.

THE ARMSTRONG SHOOTING CASE. David Hinds was on Friday morning brought up on remand, charged with assaulting and shooting a constable, and was committed to the County Jail on Wednesday last. The prisoner on being placed in the dock assumed an air of bravado, and as he glanced around the assembled and mixed crowd behind the railing, he smiled at those who it is supposed were classed among his friends.

MacKenzie, Solicitor for the County of Huron, has instructed the Huron Council in a similar manner.

ATTEMPT AT FRAUD.—A young German named Turk, who stated that he came from Guelph, was brought before a bench of Magistrates at Listowel for producing a duplicate check at the railway station there, and demanding a trunk which he had received the day he arrived in the village. The examination showed that Turk was trying to swindle the Company by claiming damages for the loss of his trunk, which he had in his boarding house. He was committed to stand his trial at the Assizes at Stratford.

CRIMINAL.—This morning Mr. Geo. Bates, son-in-law of Mr. W. S. G. Knowles died at the latter's residence, of heart disease, in the 33rd year of his age. Deceased is well known in Guelph, and was some time ago in the employ of Mr. Jas. Goldie. About four years ago he removed to Hamilton where he was engaged in the grain business. Falling into ill health he came back to Guelph a few months ago, and from that time up to his death, he remained very feeble. Deceased was a member of the Masonic fraternity and the order in town will attend the funeral in a body.
