Toronto, Nov. 24-In the burning of a"fiery cross" by white robbed figures in the northern section of Trinity College grounds and simultaneously an in North Toronto Saturday night, Toronto experienced its first ontact with the Ku Klux Klan.

Eye witnesses report that about 3.30 p. m. either eight or nine whiterobbed figures came into view from the west side of the college building.
