KLAN CEREMONIES

SEEN IN TORONTO

Toronto, Nov. 24.—In the burning of
a "fiery cross" by white robed figures
in the northern section of Trinity Col-
lege grounds and simultaneously an-
other in North Toronto Saturday
night, Toronto experienced its first
contact with the Ku Klux Klan.

Eye witnesses report that about
8.30 p. m. either eight or nine white-
robed figures came into view from
the west side of the college building.
The men forming the strange group
were walking in twos and carried
with them a wooden cross. On arriv-
ing at the edge of the ravine the
cross was fastened to an iron pipe
stuck in the ground and set afire.
There was no trouble in making it
burn for straw was fastened to it.

The cross burned in the northern
part of the city was much larger be-
ing eight or ten feet in height. Before
lighting the cross had been soaked in
oil and bound with oil waste.

WOODSTOCK'S NEW MILL FIRM.

The Flemming-Melville Company,
successors to the Smith Lumber Com-
pany of Woodstock, have organized
with the following officers: Hon. J. K.
Flemming, president and manager;
H. J. Flemming, secretary, and G. E.
Melville, manager and treasurer. The
company has men in the woods get-
ting ready for the spring operations.
They intend cutting about 1,000,000
feet of lumber and will employ 35 or
40 men. Since organization, the firm
has sent away ten carloads of lumber.
It will manufacture barrels, long lum-
ber, laths, shingles and telephone
poles, as well as hardwood in the
rough state. Having connections with
the big firm at Juniper, with its well-
developed market, this firm will go
into the wholesale business and can
buy and sell to better advantage than
can smaller firms. Among other things
it will buy and sell pulpwood. It is
one of the best equipped mills in the
province.—The Press.

H. D. ACRES COMING

TO ST. JOHN

H. D. Acres, hydro electric expert
is coming here from Ontario on
Thursday to meet the members of the
New Brunswick Electrical Power
Commission for a final conference
before New Brunswick's application
for permission to proceed with the
development of Grand Falls on the St.
John River is filed with the Interna-
tional Waterways Commission. Chief
Engineer S. R. Weston, of the com-
mission, said yesterday that it was
now expected that the formal appli-
cation would be presented to the In-
ternational Waterways Commission
by Dec. 1, but that as the regulations
called for 60 days to elapse from the
filing of the application until the hear-
ing could be held, it would therefore
be early in February before action
could be expected. In the meanwhile
Chief Engineer Weston said, plans
for the extensive works to be con-
structed at Grand Falls were being
completed by hydro construction ex-
perts.—Telegraph-Journal.
