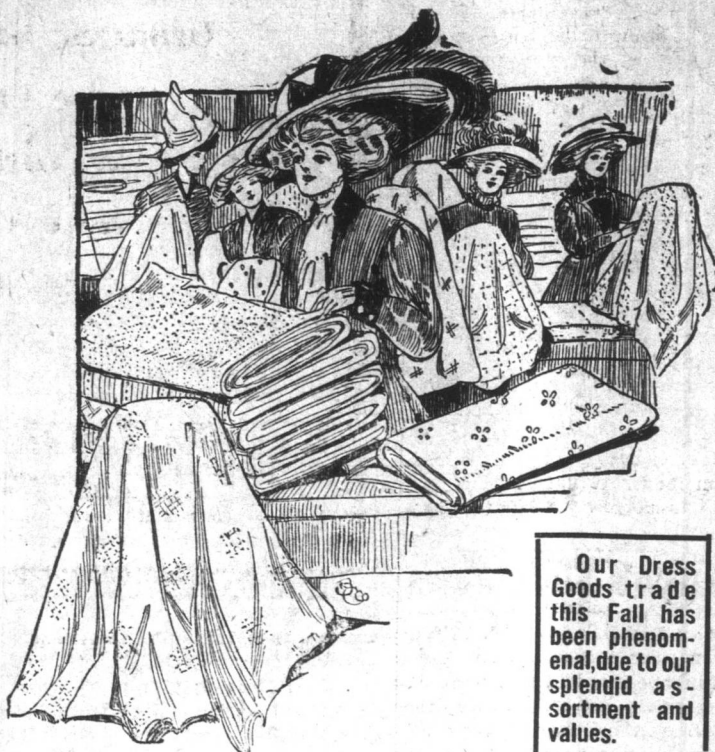

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Mr. Lloyd George on Disarmament.

Mr. Lloyd George is interviewed in the Review of Reviews, and has many interesting things to say about international armaments.

"In the grammar of ruin there are three degrees," he said: "Positive, Protection; Comparative, Armaments; Superlative, War. Why are armaments excused? Because tariff war, which is almost universal outside Britain, may lead to war of the other kind. Nations make war for markets, desiring to close those markets to their rivals.

Why We Do Not Disarm.

He admitted that he spoke bitterly and felt bitterly on this subject. Out of every million of revenue he raised, half a million had to go in armaments—but he did not deny that the expenditure on Dreadnoughts was necessary. He proceeded:—

"We cannot disarm in the midst of an armed camp. Any remedy must be international, and we are not merely willing but eagerly anxious for an international arrangement by which we could arrest this headlong race to destruction. But when we have piped to other nations they would not dance to our music. Nay, they have even misconstrued our invitation to cover an insidious design to balk their legitimate desire for self-protection, or as an intimation that the pace was getting too hot for us, and that they had only to keep on to see us drop out

of the race. This naturally makes us chary of making new overtures for any international agreement on the subject of armaments. And until such an arrangement is arrived at we have no option but to go on sadly but with unflinching resolution to maintain the comparative preponderance of naval strength which for a hundred years has been recognised by friends and foes alike as the irrefragable minimum of our national security.

"It is a game of beggar-my-neighbor, at which, if the peoples were wise, their Governments would not play. In beggar-my-neighbor it is a question as to which player is first played out. Our naval supremacy, living as we do from day to day on food brought from overseas, and with no conscript army of millions to defend our country, is a matter of life and death.

Our Naval Supremacy.

"We do not argue about it. We maintain it, and we must go on maintaining it against all challengers, even if it comes to the spending of our last penny. But those who delude themselves into imagining that we are nearer our last penny than our Protectionist neighbours should not forget that so far we have at least paid our way without having to borrow money with which to build ships—which is more than some of them can say. And although he who goes a-borrowing goes a-sorrowing, and we shall keep on paying our way from day to day out of revenue, nevertheless if the beggar-my-neighbor game is to be played out to the bitter end we have still the untouched reserve of a naval loan available to fall back upon—a resource of which our competitors have long ago had to avail themselves.

"We are not going from lack of peace, to risk the absolute immunity from invasion which is one of our most priceless national assets. We are open for a deal; we are anxious, for a deal. But no matter how heavily we may be pressed we shall

never be driven to surrender a position which, our rivals themselves being judges, is essential for our continued existence as an independent State. The basis of any such deal must of necessity be the maintenance of that humanity. That we cannot risk by any arrangement. Such proposals lead not to peace, but to war."

Train Notes.

Two Youths Arrested.

Accused of Robbery of \$200.
Two young men, named Brien and Callahan, of Buchanan Street, were arrested on the express Saturday afternoon when the train from Port aux Basques with the Sydney passengers was nearing St. John's. A message had been received by Supr. Grimes from the Chief of Police at Sydney about half an hour before the train arrived. Sergt. Mackey and Const. Tobin, the latter in plain clothes, were sent out to Waterford Bridge. Constable Tobin boarded the train there and soon located his men. They were greatly surprised when they were told that they were wanted to answer to a charge of robbing a sum of over \$200 from the cabin of a schooner at North Sydney. A large crowd gathered around the station when it was seen that two constables had two prisoners in charge. The report was circulated that the two men in custody were the Grand Falls safe crackers. The lads admitted the guilt to the police and said that they spent all the money in having a good time in Sydney, except their passage money and \$2 each left in their pockets. They had no suspicion that the Sydney police had been shadowing them, and believed that when they got on the train at Port aux Basques that all the trouble was over. They will be sent back to North Sydney for trial.

Capt. Mackey's Venture

The Minnie E. Strong, Capt. M. Mackey, arrived from "Rutherford's" bank, in the mouth of Conception Bay, last Thursday. The weather was too stormy in order to make a fair trial and the crew had only one day's trawling. They secured eight quintals of large fish when the big storm came on and they were obliged to run. It is believed that this is a fishery if followed up would become very prosperous. Capt. Mackey's venture will no doubt be followed by others. The vessel is outfitted by R. Rutherford & Co., as was reported in the Telegram exclusively a few weeks ago.

Crew Were Exhausted.

Passengers by Saturday night's train say that the crew of the schr. Empress which was lost off Cape St. Francis early Saturday morning rowed into Carbonear in a dory. There were three men in the vessel and they were for several hours in the dory exposed to all the fury of the elements and drenched from the heavy rain and spray which swept over them. Repeatedly the dory was almost swamped in the terrific sea that raged. The unfortunate men had to bail her as best they could, and so exhausted were they on arrival that they could barely walk.

This Association, which last winter held a number of most successful entertainments of various kinds and was thus enabled to give most valuable financial assistance to the two Colleges, after which it is named, has begun to make preparations for the coming winter with redoubled energy. HAS 125 WHALES.—Up to Friday of last week the whaler Hump, which is operating in Conception Bay, had 125 whales. The past five days have been so stormy that nothing could be done, while the fish are nearly as plentiful in the bay as heretofore. Last year up to this time the vessel had 140 fish.

PARIS, Oct. 15.
An unsuccessful attempt was made to dynamite the tracks of the Northern railroad near Dreuil, before the passage of the London express from Boulogne for Paris. The train was brought to a standstill but later proceeded. A dynamite cartridge had been used by the wreckers but without effect.

HAVANA, Oct. 15.
The skies cleared to-day and the gale that had held strong since Thursday morning died out. No further reports have been received from the interior as telegraph wires are still down at many points, but it is believed that the damage was confined mainly to the tobacco crop in Pinar Del Rio, the extreme Western Province. The loss at Casilda, a town in Santa Clara Province, is now thought to be limited to the unroofing of a few houses, and that the casualties reported there are of a minor character. Business locally is being resumed to-day. Many of the stores closed their doors when the storm broke.

American shipbuilding companies are not likely to bid for construction for two battleships proposed for the Chilean Navy, as despite representations by German and American interest, Chileans have not altered the original specifications which favour British builders, in that they call for certain equipment of British manufacture.
