Belleoram Notes.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir,—Even since the latter part of February, the weather on this coast has been desperately bad, and unless a great change takes place in a favorable direction it is hard to tell what time the Western Shore trips of fish are going to be made up fit for

market. The past winter's fishery went far ahead of last year's figures, but not as far as it would have gone had it not been hampered by an almost constant blockade of heavy Arctic drift

Seven of our Belleoram schooners prosecuted the fishery the past winter and secured among them about 1,000 qtls., of which the Effie M. Prior, Capt. Stephen V. Cluett, secured 800 qtls.; the Valoria, Capt. John Kearley, 600 qtls.; the Winifred, Captain Richard Critchell, 500 qtls.; the Acme, Capt. Matt. Cretchell, 450 qtls.; the Alice M. Pike, Capt. Benj. Keeping, 500 qtls.; the Nahada, Capt. John B. Dicks, 450 qtls.; the Harry Nick-erson, Capt. John M. Fudge, 750 qtls. Since they left on their second trip messages have been received stating that the Valoria had secured 400 qtls. more, the Acme, 500 qtls., the Winifred, 250 qtls. and the Valoria 800 atls. None of the others have been

heard from. The lobster fishery all round the bay to date is almost absolutely nil, the catch being less than one-third as great as that of last year at this ime, and as a result times are beginning to look gloomy indeed.

And times in Belleoram, though not at all bad are most unusually dull just now, there being no stir whatever to break the chronic monotony. Only for the Church Women's Association that manages to get up something to entertain the men when the banking schooners arrive, there would be no chance whatever to relax or intermingle in any general social way. But the members of that body prove themselves equal to the occasion whenever an opportunity offers, with the result that a tidy sum of money is realized for some worthy

purpose. They were greatly hampered the past winter by an extensive outbreak of smallpox which affected some 25 families in the place. All places of public gatherings were closed from Xmas until the last week in February. Since that time, they have had a Sale of Work and a Tea, at the former they realized \$117 and at the latter \$65. They will devote \$100 of this towards helping to pay off the debt or the new school, and \$25 to the Nfld.

Disaster fund. Since its inception here about six years ago the Association has done surprisingly good work. It has raised for various purposes during that time somewhere between three thousand and four thousand dollars. Among its most ponderous undertakings might be mentioned the placing of an organ in the church at a cost of \$700, he painting of the church at a cost of \$400, the purchasing of a carpet for the church at a cost of \$100, and their grand subscription of \$500 to the new school fund. Mrs. Simeon Cluett is the present President, and, in common with all her predecessors, she deserves great praise for her extraordinary zeal and energy with which

she goes into the good work. With considerable regret we record the announcement from the Rev. A. E. Tulk at the annual Vestry meeting, of his resignation from the Parish of Belleoram. Mr. Tulk took charge of this mission about five years ago, and by his steady zeal and untiring energy, he has transformed the "second worst" mission in the country into probably the second best. It is now a self-supporting parish, raising between two and three thousand dollars year over and above its assessment, about twice as much as raised becre he took charge. We congratulate which ever increasingly followed his willing labors amongst us, and heartly wish his even greater success wherever he may be called to work in

the future. Miss Agnes Baldwin's many friends regret to learn of her resigning her position here as assistant teacher. By ner inoffensive manner and kindly disposition she has made many friends here, especially among the little ones, who seem extremely fond

We received a severe shock a short time ago in the almost sudden death of one of our most respected townsmen in the person of Mr. E. J. Burdock. He had just started in a new business which promised extensive developments that would have been most beneficial to our people. He was greatly esteemed by all who knew him, and his early death was a sad blow to Belleoram.

We notice that F.P.U. Councils are being established all up and down the coast with almost magic quickness. Belleoram has not yet fallen in line. but there is one at St. Jacques only about three miles distant. Thanking you in advance for in-
