WHITE CROWS AND ARGURERS.

The other day I overheard a woman correcting her children. "Don't argue," she said. "It's vulgar and disagreeable." The children had been discussing some point with a loudness of tone and an irritability of manner that was vulgar and disagreeable, but that did not make the act of arguing wrong in itself. On the contrary, to argue is healthy for the mind. It is to the mental powers what exercise is to the physical.

And yet I find this prejudice against arguing is very common.

Why is it? Perhaps because so few people can argue without getting noisy and excited.

Indeed a man or woman who can argue sanely, courteously, quietly and intelligently is one of the greatest rarities in the world.

A sneer is not an argument. Yet how many people use it as such, and think because their antagonist naturally winces before this poisoned thrust they have scored a point. I overheard two people arguing the other day in regard to a fault of which one was supposed to be guilty. The one who was criticized accused his critic of having done the same thing. The critic fairly and squarely freed himself from the charge, whereupon his antagonist, felled by any fair argument, came back with, "Yes, I know you're perfect."

It hurt. Such things always hurt; the critic blushed and became confused and his antagonist looked triumphant. Yet far from justifying himself he had proved himself to his mind a coward, for it is only a coward rather than stand up and acknowledge a defeat, who will use a sneer for an argument.

Another favorite method is to try to prove that a thing is so by proving that the opposite is not so. When I was a child I would sometimes say of some alleged misdoer, "That didn't do any harm." Whereupon my grown-up antagonist would answer, "It didn't do any good, did it?" Although I then lacked the ability to fully understand how this answer failed of being logic, and the presence of mind to retort, "That doesn't prove anything," I always had a burning sense of injustice when I was put down in that way.

That species of argument is always a favorite with people who lack better weapons, especially with quick-tempered males. If you do not want a pair of masculine boots in the middle of the living room floor and the male in question has no real reason why they should be there to offer, he can always retort, "Very well, take them out and throw them in the ash barrel."

Perhaps the most trying to me of all arguers are those who argue without conviction. I feel toward them the indignation that Mrs. Brattle feels toward the whist players who play without caring whether they win or lose. When I hear a man argue one thing to-day and another thing to-morrow just because he finds an antagonist ready to take the opposite side, I never fail to show him up to his antagonist.

A man or woman who will argue only according to his honest conviction, who can stick to the point, who scorns to use unfair arguments, who can argue without losing his temper or courtesy and without shouting, and who is willing to be convinced, is rarer than a white crow.

But it is a good ideal to work for.

FELLOW COUNTRYMEN:

The Mother Country has been compelled to go to war and preserve, among other things, the rights and liberties which we all enjoy as citizens of the Empire.

Newfoundland in common with the other Oversea Dominions, has pledged itself to assist the Mother Country with material help in the present extremity.

This is to take the form of an increase of the Naval Reserve from Six Hundred to One Thousand men and the raising of a Regiment of Five Hundred men for land service abroad, and the Colony has further undertaken to assume the full cost of this contingent of Five Hundred men during the course of the war.

It is our duty and privilege, as loyal and patriotic citizens of the Empire, to voluntarily assist in supporting this movement, and, to raise a fund for that purpose. This Patriotic Fund will be applied primarily in making provision for the depending relatives of those who undertake to fight the battles of the country and the Empire by land and sea and afterwards to such other objects connected therewith as may be deemed desirable.

The need is great and in the confident expectation that this appeal will evoke a prompt and generous response, we respectfully but strongly urge all who can, to give as liberally as possible towards this most deserving object.

Household Notes

It is a good idea to keep a piece of sand paper over the sink to clean pots and pans with. Never buy spices in large quantities—they lose their flavor before you can use them up.

If you want to be sure that the bread pudding will be light, add a little baking powder to it.

Don't forget to make grape jelly—it is one of the most useful of all sweets for winter.

Watermelon salad is made with the pink melon flesh piled on lettuce leaves and served with dressing.

Sweet pickled apples are delicious served with meats. They may be made just as pickled peaches are. Lemon juice and cayenne are excellent used in French dressing, instead of black pepper and vinegar.

If a small lump of alum is put into the paste for putting paper on the wall, the mice will never gnaw the paper.

After roasting a piece of meat which is to be served cold wrap it in cheesecloth while hot. This preserves the flavor.

Wrap a piece of paper around the root of the tomato plants before they are set in the ground; the cutworms will not bother them.

To soften an old paint brush on which the paint has dried, let it simmer a few minutes in vinegar, then wash in soapy water.

Vinegar works like a charm when it comes to cleaning dirt and smoke from walls and work. Wet a flannel cloth with it and rub.

Raw cabbage is said to be much more digestible than cooked, and a delicious salad is simple shaved cabbage with a French dressing.

Olive oil may be used in cooking a good many vegetables—especially tomatoes and spaghetti. It is not perceptible, yet gives a certain smoothness.

When canning fruit the jars should be sealed immediately; if they stand they may cool sufficiently that bacteria might light and cause the fruit to spoil.

Cut out a lot of aprons, underclothing, etc., all at once and roll each garment up with all its pieces together to be ready for the time when you want a bit of work.

When a glass stopper is obstinate about coming out, heat a poker red hot and run it around the outside of the neck of the bottle. The stopper will then lift out easily.

To prevent the unpleasant odor from developing in the vases in which cut flowers stand, change the water daily and put a tiny piece of charcoal in the bottom of the vase.

When you set dishes on the ice in the refrigerator, place under them a rubber ring, such as is used on fruit jars. This will prevent their slipping as the ice melts.

When the skin has been subjected to a blow, take a little dry starch, moisten it with cold water, and lay it on the injured spot. This will prevent the skin from discoloring.
