New Year Parade.

Our Soldiers and Sailors—400 Volun-
teers Turn Out.

One of the finest parades witnessed
in the city for some time took place
yesterday forenoon when fully four
hundred of those forming the Second
Contingent of the First Newfoundland
Regiment and the Naval Reservists
who are in training on H. M. S. Calypso,
turned out jointly. At 9.30 the
battalion formed up at the C. L. B.
Armoury and under command of
Commander MacDermott, of H. M. S.
Calypso, and headed by the C. L. B.
C. C. C. and Highlanders' bands,
marched via Harvey and Military
Roads to Government House grounds,
followed by an immense crowd of ad-
mirers. The volunteers after going
through various evolutions efficiently,
they were inspected and addressed by
His Excellency the Governor. They
have begun the New Year in the pro-
per spirit and in your hands rests the
honour and good name of Britain's
oldest and loyal Colony," said His Ex-
cellency. Continuing, he congratu-
lated them on their military appear-
ance, wished them every happiness
and prosperity and hoped that they
would all return at the expiration of
their war covered in glory.

The Prime Minister, Sir Edward
Morris, then spoke briefly and encour-
agingly, expressing the hope that
twelve months hence we would be
celebrating a great national victory.
Ranks were then reformed and de-
parture was made through the city, the
bands discoursing lively patriotic airs
en route, whence return to the arm-
oury was made. About a hundred of
the volunteers were dressed in khaki
uniforms and looked neat and trim.
The fine appearance of the men, par-
ticularly the Naval Reservists, was
favorably commented on by eye-wit-
nesses. All the officers of our city
brigade took part in the parade and
added in no small measure to the suc-
cess of the New Year Parade.

TORPEDOED FORE AND AFT.

LONDON, To-day.
The Daily Chronicle states that the

HEWLETT'S STORY OF HIS GALL-
ANT RAID.

YNUIDEN, To-day.
After spending six days on a Dutch
trawler in the North Sea, during which
time he was given up for dead, Flight
Commander Francis Hewlett, The Chro-
nicle's Chatham correspondent, says
that the formidable left that port on

ture. I was the first aviator to ascend
when all was ready for the raid, he
said. It was bright but misty over
the land, so I could not see the effect

and was taken on board the trawler.
There were ten men on board and all

that on reaching Heligoland in the
course of the flight to Cuxhaven, Hew-
lett ran into a thick fog and went into
Germany some way beyond Cuxhaven,
but a glimpse through a rift in the
mist enabled him to find his bearings
and return. Suddenly he caught sight
of the Zeppelin sheds descending
to within 250 yards dropped some
bombs. He was heavily fired at but
flew away untouched. He made a note
of the exact position of the Zeppelin
sheds. Making for the sea to be taken
on board a British ship he saw a Ger-
man squadron in Heligoland. Fight-
ing and descending he dropped some
bombs, one of which fell on a big ves-
sel but he could not tell with what re-
sult. However he saw a cloud of
smoke rise from the vessel. It was just
after this that engine trouble began
and he was forced to descend.

FORTIFYING THEIR HOLDINGS.

PETROGRAD, To-day.
The inactivity of Germans in the
neighborhood of Warsaw for some
days past is explained according to
reports reaching here, which claim
they have employed this time in for-
tifying the territory already taken up
on the Bzura River and along the left
bank of the Lower and Middle Vistula
River. According to reliable informa-
tion, Lodz, Lwow, and other towns
in Poland are now as strongly fortified
as Kalisz and Czestochowa. The
Germans have attempted to make this
territory as difficult to invade as the
German soil.
