# Preparing Bills of Losses For Germany's Footing.

## Extradition of Kaiser Will be Demanded---Another Crown Gone---No Change in Berlin Government.

**SEEMS LIKE A JOB.**

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 2. Sir Frederick E. Smith, Attorney General, interviewed to-day, said that the British War Cabinet including the Colonial representatives, has unanimously decided to press Holland to extradite the former German Emperor.

**A REQUEST.**

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 2. A number of the Soldiers' and Workmen's Councils in Germany have requested the German Government to have former Emperor William tried by a German tribunal, according to a News Agency telegraph from Berlin. The government, it is stated, will submit the question to the National Assembly.

**BELGIUM'S DAMAGE.**

BRUSSELS, Dec. 2. The Central Industrial Committee of Belgium, after an investigation, estimates Belgium's damage through German military occupation and seizure of machinery and raw material at 6,000,800,000 francs.

**AMERICA'S BILL.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. American citizens were advised in a statement to-day by Secretary of State Lansing that they file at the State Department within 30 days from December 1st, information concerning losses sustained through German submarine warfare, either before or after the United States entered the war. Losses and details concerning them covering cargoes or personal property or effects should be submitted, whether the property was insured or only partly insured, and regardless of whether the property was carried in American or foreign vessels.

**KING NICHOLAS DEPOSED.**

LONDON, Dec. 2. King Nicholas of Montenegro, has been deposed by the Skupshina, the Montenegrin National Assembly, according to a message received here from Prague to-day. The despatch was sent from Prague by the Czech-Slovak Press Bureau by way of Copenhagen. It says that the Skupshina voted the deposition on Friday last and declared for a union of Montenegro with Serbia under King Peter. The family of the King was included in the act of deposition.

**NO DEMONSTRATIONS.**

AMERICAN ARMY OF OCCUPATION, Dec. 1. (By the A.P.)—No demonstrations either friendly or hostile marked the entry of Major General Hickman's army into Germany to-day.

**AMERICAN PRISONERS COMPLAIN.**

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 2. American prisoners of war from German prisons, complain of scanty food and bad housing conditions. General Pershing has informed the War Department.

**ENTERS LIEGE.**

BRUSSELS, Dec. 1. (British Wireless Service.)—King Albert and the Belgian royal family made their official entry into Liege Saturday at the head of the troops who conducted the heroic defence of the town in 1914, says an official statement. The king, queen and General Lemah, the defender of Liege, were cheered enthusiastically by the crowds. Almost at the same time, the statement adds, a Belgian cavalry brigade entered Aix la Chapelle, Germany, at the request of German authorities.

**"FAILED TO CONQUER."**

PARIS, Dec. 2. Discussing the situation in Germany brought about by the former Emperor's renunciation, the National Zeitung of Hasle, according to a despatch to L'Information, says: "The impression is made that the Hohenzollerns were dismissed because they failed to conquer."

**THE EMPEROR'S FLIGHT.**

LONDON, Dec. 2. The flight of the former German Emperor from Germany is condemned in many quarters there and particularly by the soldiers, according to the Berlin correspondent of the Berlingske Tidende, of Copenhagen says a despatch received at the Danish capital. Dr. Strager, a Professor of Law, writes in the "Der Tag" of Berlin as follows: "No criticism would be too strong because the Emperor's action was unkingly, unsoldierly and unmanly, and served to give the death blow to the monarchical idea in Germany. A monarch cannot run away like a school boy. A man, who like this last of the Hohenzollerns, represents five centuries of history, commits by such conduct a crime against the dynasty and the people. If he thought himself capable of retaining his position, the battlefield offered him an opportunity of at least making a kingly and dignified exit, casting a fresh lustre on the monarchical idea and not because they violated all laws of humanity."

**WILL LIKELY ACT.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. A joint resolution introduced by Representative Rodenburg, of Illinois, Republican, proposes that Congress declare President Wilson's trip to Europe "Constitutes an inability to discharge the powers and duty of the office of President," and that so long as he is away from the country the Vice-President act as President. It was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

**THE MEAT COMBINE.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. The Federal Trade Commission in a supplementary report submitted to Congress today, charged the five big meat packing companies of the country with a combination in a restraint of trade and with controlling the sale of live stock and fresh meats.

**WORKS BETTER THAN THE NEW.**

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 2. The old governmental machinery in Berlin is still operating, according to Kust-Elsner, the Bavarian Premier, as quoted in the Telegraf of this city. Elsner, in speaking at to-day's meeting of the Soldiers' and Workmen's Council for Bavaria, at Munich, stated, "Last week I went to Berlin, where the entire machinery of the old government is still working." Referring to the revelations made public at Munich in the form of documentary evidence of Germany's responsibility for the war, Elsner is quoted as saying, "From the secret documents of the Bavarian Legation, I published those which will prove to the silliest, to whom we owe the war."

**IN COLLISION.**

LONDON, Dec. 2. The Cunard liner Orduna, inward bound, was in collision to-day with the British tanker Konakry, near Galleyhead. The Orduna proceeded to Liverpool and the extent of the damage done to her has not been determined. A warship rescued the crew of the Konakry, except the captain, first officer and 4th engineer who refused to leave the vessel. Tugs are standing by the Konakry. The Cunard liner Orduna left New York for Liverpool on Nov. 23.

**REICHSTAG MEETS SHORTLY.**

PARIS, Dec. 2. The Reichstag will convene shortly, according to newspapers in South Germany, says a Zurich despatch.

**INTERESTING INCIDENT.**

LONDON, Dec. 2. An interesting incident is related in connection with the arrival of surrendered German U-boats. It was dark when they reached their moorings in the Stour River. Lieut. Commander Gaimes, who had piloted one of the submarines in, called his signal man below for a moment. On coming on deck he noticed that the British ensign which had been hoisted on the boat had disappeared. The British commander gave the German commander two minutes in which to produce it. Well within that time the ensign made its appearance from out of a bag belonging to the Germans.

### Ticketing the Germans.

(From the New York Tribune.)

It is an admirable proposal by Senator Lodge that stores and dealers shall make public declarations of the fact when they are dealing in German goods. The tariff requires the branding of goods with the name of the country where it was manufactured. But there are some limitations on the enforcement of the rule in practice, we believe, and the law will doubtless require strengthening. In addition, it needs a supplemental act of the character of that introduced by Senator Lodge, giving the purchaser a general warning. What must be remembered in all this legislation is that the German is apt at dissimulation and possesses an organization and a propaganda system in this country, as in every other country, that will utilize every means, fair and foul, to evade our laws. Harsh punishments must be named. Vigilance must be constant. It will require persistent effort to prevent deception and forestall fraud. If this system of informing the public can be made effective the individual can act according to his conscience. This is surely his due. Any other system would be an outrage upon the right of free choice and individual conscience of Americans.
