To-Day's Messages.

CREW SAVED.

BOSTON, May 3.
The crew of the motor schooner Risor who were forced to abandon their vessel when it was burned two hundred and fifty miles East of New York yesterday, were transferred early to-day from the British steamer, City of Canton, which had picked them up, to the coastguard cutter Anshett. The cutter reported by wireless that she would take nineteen men of the Risor to New Bedford. The Risor was bound from Norfolk for Denmark.

LIFE SAVERS DROWNED.

PORTSMOUTH, N.H., May 3.
Three members of a coastguard crew at Appledore Island were drowned late to-day, when their 30-foot sailing launch was struck by a squall and sank. They were Reginald C. Chesterton and Leo E. Foss, both of Jonesport, Maine, and Sherman Parker of Cape Elizabeth, Maine. Elmer Alley, the fourth man in the boat was rescued.

GENERAL MELEE.

OPPELIN, Silesia, May 3.
Armed with knives, revolvers, clubs and stones, German men and boys attacked the Poles, who were holding Sunday demonstration on the occasion of the Polish National Festival, and in a pitched battle that followed, two persons were killed and a score wounded, including a Polish priest. Polish demonstrators had gathered on all parts of the surrounding country following the German Labor parade on Saturday, and were forming a procession on the outskirts of the city, when a large crowd of Ger-

mans attacked them. The German Security Police, upon which the Inter-Allied Commission depends to maintain order, engaged the combatants, and Colonel Percival, the British Commander, hastened to the scene and plunging into the melee helped to separate the fighters.

ENLARGING THE VISTA.

PARIS, May 3.
A London despatch to the Temps to-day, says that in Supreme Council circles there is an inclination to ensure continuing the work of the Supreme Council by making it an International Governmental organization. It is even probable, the despatch declares, that the admission of German delegates to the Council will be considered. Russian delegates also being admitted sooner or later.

REVOLUTIONARY GAINS.

EL PASO, Texas, May 3.
Juarez to-night is in the hands of Sonora revolutionists. The revolution was peaceable, and its announcement, by General Gonzales Escabo, was accompanied by popular celebrations. The Obregon Junta, from El Paso passed into Juarez to-night. A telegram from Consul Stuart in Chihuahua City to the American Consul, now in Juarez, sent by way of Douglas, Arizona, to-night, said the State capital is quiet, and the telegram added that Parol and Cusihirachick, two important mining towns, are in the hands of the rebels, and operation of the mines and smelters were interrupted when the change of Government occurred. Military men of the mining districts controlled by rebels, have announced that foreigners will be permitted to continue there, and will be given protection. All foreigners resident there are being treated with the utmost consideration.

UPRISINGS IN MOSCOW.

WARSAW, May 3.
Public riots and uprisings among soldiers are reported to have occurred in Moscow, upon receipt of news of the Polish success. Reports say there are increasing demands for a change of Government.

NOT CORRECT.

LONDON, May 3.
The announcement by a newspaper in Warsaw, that the Poles have occupied Kiev, is unfounded, says a despatch to the London Times from Warsaw. The Poles, however, have taken Fastov, about forty miles south west of Kiev on the railroad, and are continuing their advance, the despatch adds.

THE PRINCE'S DEMOCRACY.

AUCKLAND, May 3.
The Prince of Wales resumed his tour of New Zealand by train to-day, the strike of railway men having been ended. This afternoon the Prince reached Taumarunui, having been welcomed everywhere with enthusiasm. An interesting incident connected with the railway service is related. Prior to the settlement of the walk-out the Prince was told there would be no difficulty in finding men to run the royal train. "Will they run trains for the people," the Prince inquired. "At present they will not," the railroad official replied. "That being so," said the Prince, "they cannot run trains for me. I am one of the people."

ADDITION TO NAVY.

LONDON, May 4.
Six former German warships, the Baden, Helligoland, Posen, Rhineland,

Westfalen and Nuremberg and 124 submarines have been allocated to Great Britain, according to an announcement in the House of Commons yesterday.

HALFHEARTED STRIKE.

PARIS, May 4.
Information, late last night, showed that the strike was making virtually no headway, and while most of the dock workers at Bordeaux, Marseilles, Havre, Brest and Dunkirk went out yesterday afternoon, many railroad men are returning to their work. As for the miners, who constitute the third section of the triple alliance, the men in less important fields have brought about a partial strike, but those in the principal fields of the north have not yet decided to join the movement. There is a general opinion among them that, as they have not been called upon to support the railroads, the movement, so far as they are concerned, is non-existent.

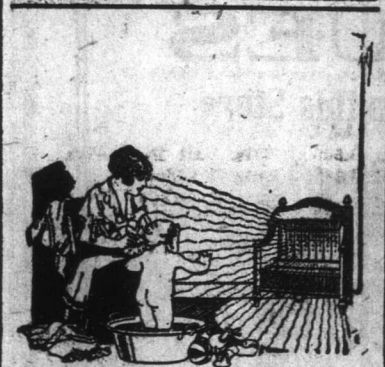
