SMYRNA, Sept. 12. Seven hundred thousand persons in Smyrna face famine within a week unless food supplies arrive, according to the Managing Director of Near East Relief who is superintending relief measures. Food must come by boat as the sea is the only route now open.

But this is the moment to tell the United States that they are making a mistake that we are neither military nor imperialist, and that the French people deserve the enthusiastic confidence of its friends."

Photo Sculpture.

At the Royal Photographic Society exhibition in London, Eng., a demonstration was recently made of a process of "Photo-sculpture." The subject to be photographed is illuminated by a projector, as shown in an illustrated article in the Popular Mechanics Magazine, which throws a spiral of light, similar to the groove in a phonograph record, upon it. This spiral is distorted, on the negative, by the irregularities of the subject. A positive is made, on glass, to be used in the carving machine. This has a disk, to hold the material to be carved, a carrier for the photographic record, and a microscope and high-speed drill, mounted together. The operator moves the drill so that it cuts the material at varying depths according to form of the subject. In this way excellent reliefs have been obtained in wood, ivory, and alabaster.
