Captain Marshall Replies to Daily Mail.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir--Would you kindly allow me space in your paper to make some objections against the editorial of yesterday's Mail, regarding the petition presented to the Honourable members of the House of Assembly on Monday. The Editor goes on to say, "Never before the initiation of the Labrador steam service has the claim been raised against non-certified masters and mates. And I will go farther than that and say it never would have been raised, if there was foreign service to warrant the employment of these men." The Editor no doubt, would be glad to make this political, but such is not the case. That petition is pure and simple non-political, for it is known to the Editor that some of the signatures attached to that petition were supporters of his party and it was not made with any political view whatever, but appealed to the Hon. member if it was fair play to have men with master's certificates walking the streets without employment, some of them having put in 40 years to sea, men who know the Labrador coast as well as foreign coastwise. We venture to say that we can do the work of the S. S. Watchful as well as her present master, and further, if an S.O.S. call should happen to present itself, can also find the position given. The Editor of the "Mail" is absolutely wrong when he makes a statement that not one of the single gentlemen, whose signature is to that petition, had any experience of Labrador coast as some of them have had quite an experience. In justice to the Master Mariners, I want to point out to the Editor of the "Daily Mail" that the profession of a Master Mariner, one who has his qualification, is just as much of a profession as an M.D. or Lawyer, and has something to protect. If I should want a script to-day, I would have to apply to a Medical practitioner, and it should be, if you want a master by all means take a man with a certificate. The Editor refers to all the ships coastwise, I am not reflecting on these men or any man in particular, but they would be better men if they had a certificate. In justice to Mr. Higgins, I may say there was no particular wish or desire on his part to present that petition. The signatories would be more pleased if one of the members of the Government would do so. That was the desire of the petitioners. The undersigned wishes it to be understood that the petition presented is non-political, and the signatories to that petition (some of them if not all) instead of fighting politics this spring, were fighting and endeavouring to bring the needed supplies to the country. Thanking you, Mr. Editor.

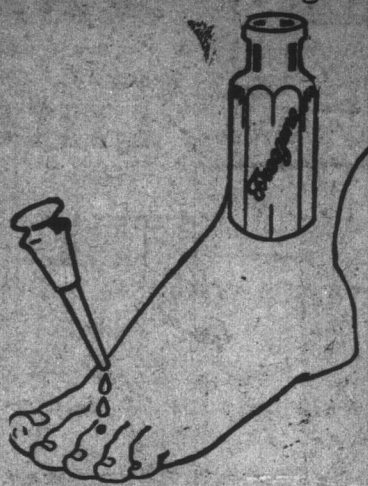
