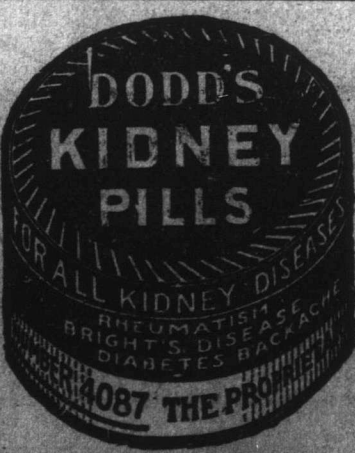

Mount Everest Wins First Round

CLIMBERS RETREAT TO BASE AFTER 48 HOURS BLIZZARD.

Mount Everest has won "round one" of the struggle between it and its would-be conquerors—the Bruce expedition.
A great blizzard which lasted continuously for forty-eight hours with temperature as much as minus 22 Fahrenheit, led to the abandonment of camps 2 and 3, and a return to the base.
The climbers suffered severely. A Gurka died from haemorrhage of the brain; one man had frost-bitten feet, and another a broken leg, while there were two severe cases of bronchitis.
It was hoped to recouper camp 3 in three or four days time, according to Lt.-Col. E. F. Norton, The Times correspondent.

Terrible Wind.

Lt.-Col. E. F. Norton, writing from Base Camp, Rongbuk, under date May 13, first tells of his arrival at No. 2 Camp on May 7.
Then he describes the arrival from No. 3 Camp of a party of porters—worn, crippled men coming stag-gering and struggling across the glacier. They had been driven out by exposure and exhaustion.
"On the morning Mallory arrived at breakfast from No. 3 Camp, and we held a council of war. Mallory's story was short and sweet.
"Temperature as much as minus 22 Fahrenheit, 10 deg. lower than anything met in 1922, coupled with terrible wind and the failure of the majority of stores from No. 2 to reach No. 3 Camp, explains the rout of the first party."
Next day a party left for No. 3 Camp, and en route met Mr. Shephard, with his beard and moustache iced so that he looked like Father Christmas.

"Now began a blizzard lasting continuously for forty-eight hours. All woke at No. 3 Camp on the morning of the 10th to find the tents filled with inches of powdery snow.
"The wind appeared to be shot high in the air over the North Col, Rapiad at Lhakpala, the three passes sur-ounding us and, from some point high in the zenith, descended on the camp like a terror on a rat-pit, and shook our little tents like rats.
Then followed the retreat to the base camp down a "wild corridor" resembling a transformation scene at Drury Lane. This bleak camp, which was reached on May 12, seemed "a garden of roses after No. 3."
Lieut.-Col. Norton concludes as follows:
"The end of Round One finds us discomfited, but very far from defeated. A hitch, but by no means the crash was feared, has come."

"We have one man with seriously frost-bitten feet, one with a broken leg, and two severe cases of bronchitis and, worst of all, Lancelotti Shamsheerun, of the 6th Gurkhas, suffering apparently from haemorrhage of the brain.
"We lose inevitably five or six days of the original programme.
"Since writing the above, I have to record with the greatest regret the death of Shamsheerun.
"The death of this splendid young man in the prime of youth is much felt by all the members of the expedition."—The Times World, Copy-right.

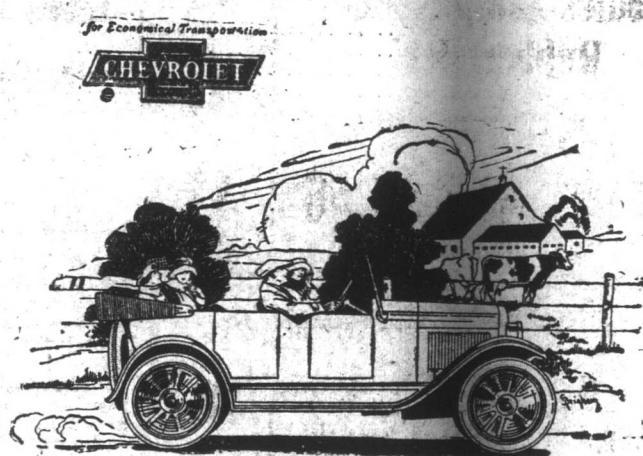

LAST NIGHT'S FOOTBALL

Guards 2 Goals; B.I.S. 1.
The game played last night between the Guards and the B.I.S. resulted in a strenuous fight which at times became very rough and gave Referee Brien almost more than he could do to retain control. The result was a win for the Guards by a score of 2 goals to 1. The B.I.S. winning the toss, elected to defend the eastern goal in the first half. The Guards, having advantage of the strong wind and sun. For the first ten minutes of play the Irishmen kept the ball in the Guards territory, and many were the escapes on goal. The Methodist

lads found it difficult to control the ball and lost several good chances to score. Play transferred from end to end for some minutes, and soon saw the Irish boys backed up in their own goal. The Guards increased the pace and before the period ended Macklin and Quick, for the Guards, each had found the net, to their opponent's nil.

2nd Period.

Upon crossing over, the B. I. S. players tried in vain to score, but the Guards set up a wonderful defence and repulsed all attacks. From then on play became very rough. Deliberate trips and kicking was noticeable, and Referee Brien was given a very busy period. The Guards forwards made repeated attempts to work the ball west, but try as they would they had no luck. Macklin on one occasion was laid low by Constantine, and it was feared his leg had been broken. He quickly recovered however and continued the game, suffering from painful injuries to his knee. It took the B.I.S. players twenty minutes of the second period to find the net. Not an upon, picking up a pretty pass, handled the ball, and brought it in the goal. The Guards claimed "hands," but Referee Brien, who was close alongside, ruled otherwise. During the remaining minutes of play the Irishmen tried hard to send home the equalizer, but the stalwart defence set up by the Guards proved impenetrable and no further scoring resulted. On one occasion Dr. Fox sent in a low shot but Thistle butted the ball clear of danger just in the nick of time. The game ended Guards 2 goals; B.I.S. 1.
Severe criticism was heard regarding the tactics adopted by certain players and it is evident that if the spirit of the game is to be maintained the rules will have to be more strictly enforced or extreme penalties inflicted.
