BLOODIEST BATTLE OF WAR A SKIRMISH

Rome, Sept. 18.—The most sanguinary engagement of the war in Tripoli was fought yesterday near Derne, a town on the Mediterranean coast, 140 miles north-west of Benghazi. The Italians lost 60 men and 15 wounded. The Turks and Arabs left more than 500 dead on the field. Prisoners, including an Arab chief, fell into the hands of the Italians.

Advance of Coal Industry in Alberta Has Been Amazing

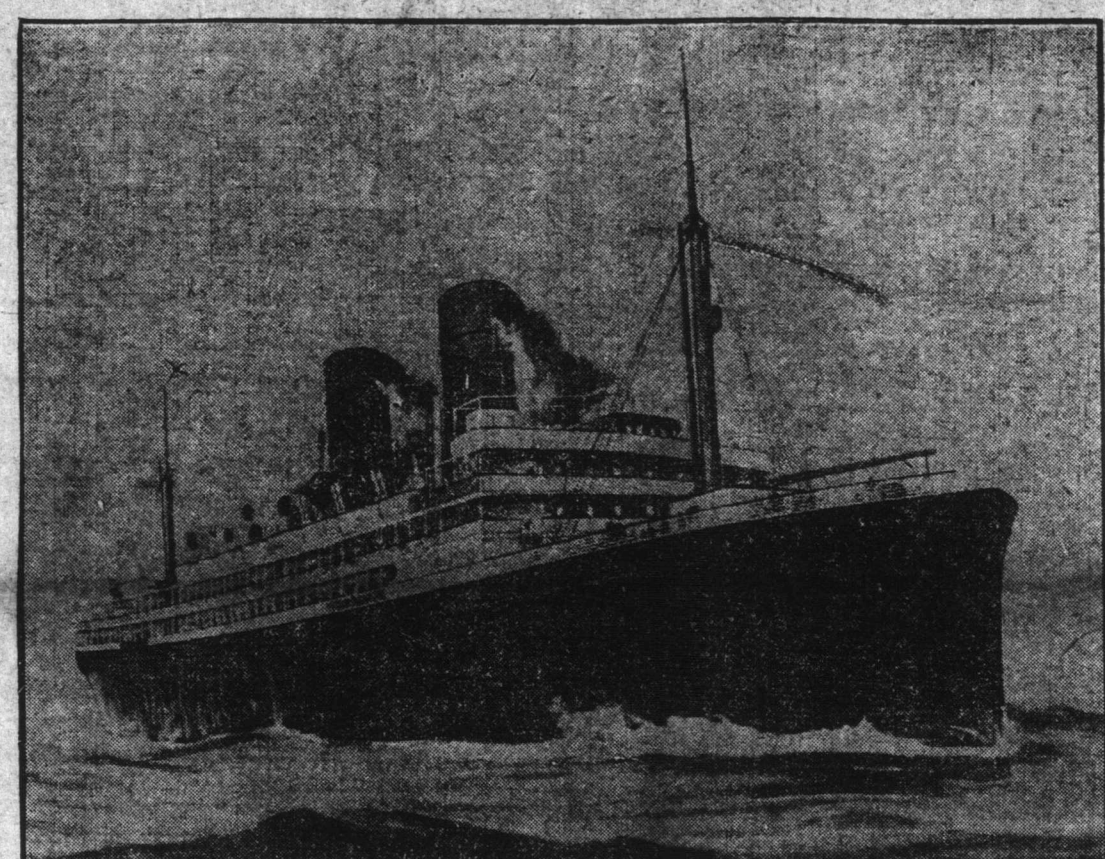
Quebec Furnishes Three-Quarters of World's Asbestos Supply

Victory, B. C., Sept. 18.—The first semi-annual meeting of the Canadian Mining Institute in session here, passed a resolution today urging the Dominion government to appoint a minister of mines.

The gathering was presided over by Dr. A. E. Barlow, of Montreal, who in his presidential address referred to the highly prosperous condition of the mining industry in Canada. In Nova Scotia, he said, while gold mining was declining this had been more than made up by coal output, which this year would be the largest in the history of the province. In New Brunswick, coal, iron, and gas were soon to be developed. Quebec was on the eve of the discovery of new mineral areas, and at the present moment this province produced 75 per cent of the world's asbestos. Quebec had also the largest copper mine in Canada.

LUMBER MILLS LOST MUCH IN RAINY RIVER

Warroad, Minn., Sept. 18.—The international waterways commission sat here this afternoon. Before leaving International Falls, G. T. Simpson, on behalf of the Shovel Point interests, which include three large lumber mills, stated that the firms cut logs one hundred million feet per annum, and expected to do so for the next twenty-five years. Two thousand men were employed in the forests and mills. The people of Spooner and Besudette depend on constant and uninterrupted operation of the plants. Although the companies estimated that they had suffered damage to the extent of a quarter of a million dollars through the stoppage of the mills, logs, cut and uncut, and business through the lack of flow of water.



"HANDS ACROSS THE PACIFIC"—LINKING UP TWO DOMINIONS—The new Canada-Australian steamer Niagara of the Union Steamship company of New Zealand. She will be in commission in eight months. The vessel is 522 feet long, 66 feet wide, with 13,000 tonnage. Her passenger and cargo equipment will be of the highest class. The speed is 17 knots, and her engines are equipped to burn either oil or coal. The service is subsidized by both the Canadian and New Zealand governments.

PEACE NOW CERTAIN BETWEEN ITALY AND TURKEY

Italian Representative Very Confident of Satisfactory Conclusion Very Soon

Negotiations Are Proceeding Very Satisfactorily at Switzerland

Italian Representatives Have Full Authority to Conclude Agreement

London, Sept. 18.—The Italian representative of public works and one of the delegates representing Italy at the peace negotiations which have been going on in Switzerland, discussed briefly today the possibility of a settlement satisfactory to both Italy and Turkey being reached. He said: "The negotiations are proceeding favorably, and I hope they will soon be successfully ended. I cannot, however, discuss the proposed terms. The Italian delegates have full power to conclude peace here in Switzerland. The long delay in the four parties has been the result of having in the earlier stages to refer the more important questions to headquarters. Signor Bertolini, who has recently been in Rome, having before the premier and foreign minister the latest phase of the negotiations, rejoined his fellow delegates here today. He declared that the alleged talks of peace as published in the Paris Temps were of such a nature as to be a mere fantasy. He declined to disclose to specify wherein they were faulty. The question of sovereignty over Tripoli and Cyrenaeia seems to be the chief stumbling block."
