An act has gone through the Ontario Legislature compelling municipal officials who are designated as registrars under the Vital Statistics Act to make returns of marriages, births and deaths monthly instead of quarterly, as heretofore. The pay which the municipal councils have had to put up for this clerical work has hitherto been 20c each, no doubling up for marriages and this is to be increased to 25c for the work being done three times as often. The vital statistics will average between 20 and 40 per year in townships, villages and small towns, which will mean one to two dollars more pay each year for the municipal clerks.
