When the workmen go out of the building, and that will be almost immediately, all that is wanted to make it ready to receive the consumptive is that it be supplied with beds and other furnishing appointments, so charge whatever being made for admittance.

Better Than Expected.

"It is my happy privilege to present to the House to-day," Mr. Fielding began, "another chapter in the continued story of Canada's prosperity. A year ago, when addressing the House under similar circumstances, I ventured to express the opinion that, in view of the very rapid progress which our country had been making for a number of years, we might almost suppose that we had reached the crest of the wave. I did not anticipate any immediate depression, or for that matter any serious depression at all, but it did seem to me that after a number of years of very rapid progress it would not be unreasonable if we should expect something like a check, a period of rest, when the country would no longer go forward with rapidity, though after that period of rest it might again go forward with leaps and bounds. Some hon, gentlemen on the other side of the House thought I took somewhat too hopeful a view. The signs of the times, they thought, indicated that already we had entered on a period of depression. Now, with the operations of another year before us, and with a very pleasant outlook for the future, I think we can congratulate ourselves that conditions have turned out better than any of us expect—much better than some of our hon, friends on the other side ed—much better than some of our hon. friends on the other side thought—better even than the more hopeful view which I had taken my-self.

"The past year has been one of "The past year has been one of great activity throughout the Dominion. In nearly all the great branches of industry there has been a fair degree of prosperity; in the paramount industry of agriculture, which is, and I believe must long continue to be, the foundation of our country's prosperity, the conditions have been particularly gratifying, especially in Manitoba and the Northwest, where an increased fying, especially in Manitoba and the Northwest, where an increased acreage and an abundant harvest gave us vast stores of grain which taxed all our facilities of transportaxion and warned us as to the need of making fuller provisions for hand-ling those glorious treasures of the west.

We are all aware of the fact that during the first part of the ten years' period there was not a great activity in the business affairs of Canada. couraging. From the financial point of view the Finance Minister went on to say the results of the year 1901 had been exceedingly satisfactory. The revenue, \$52,514,700, was an increase over that of the previous year and the increases had been general, \$51,136 in customs, \$450,190 in excise, \$255,409 in postoffice, \$439,-219 in railways, \$129,275 in Dominion lands and \$18,895 in mis-219 in railways, \$129,275 in Dominion lands and \$18,895 in miscellaneous. The excise duties showed an increase in all branches. The consumption had been greater in spirits, in malt, in cigars, cigarettes, tobacco and snuff and in the consumption of raw ieaf.

The consolidated fund expenditure for the last fiscal year was \$46,866,367, an increase of \$3,891,088. 866,367, an increase of \$3,891,088. The total capital expenditure was \$11,116,498, as against \$9,742,187 in 1900, an increase of \$1,374,311. The total expenditure, capital and consolidated, was \$37,982,866, as against \$52,777,467, an increase in total expenditure of \$5,265,399. Coming, now, to the public debt, Mr. Fielding said the net debt on June 30, 1901, was \$268,480,003, an increase of \$2,986,196 since the preceding year. But during the

ceding year. But during cast five years the average and increase had been but \$1. 996,514, as against an annual average of \$6,563,075 during the eighteen years previous to 1896.

Surplus Was \$5,648,333,

The surplus last year was \$5,648, The surplus last year was \$5,648,-333, and these surpluses were not arrived at by any change in the method of book-keeping, as some hon, gentlemen opposite charged. The average surplus for the past five years had been \$3,348,705, against an average surplus of \$1,-554,539 a year during the 18 years of Tory rule.

current year, there is a considerable
increase in the revenue and a corresponding increase in the expenditures.
We are lucky people when we can

went on to say that he estimated the went on to say that he estimated the revenue for the current year at \$56, 800,000, as against last year's revenue of \$52,514,701, a probable increase of \$4,285,298. The expenditure he estimated at \$51,000,000, an went on to say that he estima ture he estimated at \$51,000,000, an increase over last year's expenditure of \$4,133,632. Thus the increases in revenue and expenditure would about balance each other, leaving the surplus at \$5,800,000, nearly the same relact year.

'As to the capital expenditure of "As to the capital expenditure of the present year," said Mr. Fielding, "it is exceptionally large, the largest we have had for some years. I estimate that at the close of the year we shall have to charge capital \$14,250,000, as against \$11,116,000 for last year." Among the many expenditures which would bring this about were railway subsidies, iron bounties, amounting to \$700,000, Intercolonial equipment and \$950,000 representing awards to two of the provinces.

Addition to Public Debt.

The result is a larger addition The result is a larger addition to the public debt than in any previous year in the history of this Govern-ment. The gross estimated expendi-ture will be about \$65,250,000, and ment. The gross estimated expenditure will be about \$65,250,000, and the amount which I anticipate we shall have to add to the debt of the Dominion for the current year will be close upon \$6,000,000. This will be, as I have stated, the largest addition to the public debt under the present administration, and will be almost in a line with, though a shade above, the addition made to the public debt in the last year of the late Government, when the addition was \$5,422,000. You see it has taken us five years to catch up to them in that one matter. But even with this addition to the debt the average for the present administration was but \$2,793,000 a year during their term of office, against \$6,363,000 added yearly during all the years of Conservative rule. rule.

With respect to the year which will begin on July 1 next, Mr. Fielding thought it too early to attempt anything like a close calculation. He saw no reason why we should not look forward to a very hopeful year, but much would depend upon the har-vest. If it should turn out as good as last year, the country might look forward hopefully. Should there be a bad harvest or anything of that sort, it would be the duty of the Government to observe the signs the time and limit the expenditure accordingly. There had been no loan from the money markets of London since 1897, when he borrowed \$10,-000,000. Since then the necessities of finance had been met by temporary loans, of which there was considerable outstanding, which had to be provided for in addition to the loans maturing. But whether he would borrow now or next year would be determined by the condition of the money markets, and in the meantime he would ask Parliament for power to borrow.

Canada's Prosperity.

Mr. Fielding then quoted figures from the trade and navigation returns to show the increase in Canada's foreign trade, and referred also to the increase in bank deposits, note circulation and railway traffic as indicating the growing prosperity. dicating the growing prosperity of Canada. During the eight months of the current year, as compared with the corresponding period of 1901, our total imports had increased from \$114,000,000 to \$123,000,000; our exports of domestic products had in-creased from \$126,676,000 to \$135 -

in immigration, indicating that at last the great work of filling up the Northwest Territories had begun in

enquiry into the paper manufacturers' combine, in consequence the Government had reduced the duty on news print from 25 per cent. to 15 per cent. The reduction had been intended to apply to ordinary newspaper, but it had been re-presented to the Government that the change did not go far chough to cover the paper used by weekly news-papers. When the Canadian Press Association furnished the necessary information to show that the reduce tion did not carry out the intentions of the Government in this respect, it would be amended to do so.

Dealing with the applications which had been made to the Government for encouragement to the beet-root sugar industry, either by way of a bounty or by increasing the cus-toms duties, Mr. Fielding said that neither proposition commended itself to the judgment of the Government. The duty on sugar was high enough already; as for a bounty it was debatable if it would help the industry, it had certainly failed to do so in years past. The present customs duty of \$1.26 on sugar af-forded sufficient incidental protection and the competition from continental countries promised to become a less disturbing element owing to the probable abandonment of the bounty probable abandonment of the bounty system. Besides, there was the On-tario bounty of one-half cent, which also afforded an encouragement. In addition, the Government admitted machinery for beet root sugar factories free; also structural material for building, and these concessions would be continued for another year. In order that Canadian manufacturers of machinery might not be injurious-ly affected it was proposed to grant them a drawback on all duties paid upon iron or steel entering into the manufacture of machinery or struc-tural material for beet sugar factor-

No Tariff Changes.

"We do not propose any tariff changes this session," said Mr. Field-

He did not claim that the tariff was perfect; but it proved well adapted to the requirements of the country. Tariff stability was most desirable. Still, as conditions chang-ed at home and abroad, the Govremment would be obliged to take notice of such changes, too. (Hear, hear.) Yet the Government thought the time was not opportune to make changes. In the first place, before yielding to the claims for further protection, on the part of certain industries the Government should have dustries, the Government should have the industrial census, which he pected would be ready next year.

pression had prevailed in that counpression had prevaled in that coun-try. It was owing to Canada's ef-forts that the most favored nation treaty between that country and Great Britain was denounced. In consequence of this Canada came into the class of non-treaty countries, the products of which were subject the products of which were subject to the higher tariff in Germany. But the privileges which Germany lost in Canada, were not privileges which rightfully belonged to any foreign nation, but privileges which properly belonged to the family circle of the British Empire. Canada was quite willing to give to the products of Germany the same treatment as given to those of any other foreign nation, and that was other foreign nation, and that was Germany could ask.
