The result of the voting in East Elgin yesterday, as given below, shows several changes in the vote, but in the total gives Mr. A. B. Ingram, the Conservative candidate, a majority of 153. It was a good, hot fight from start to finish.

The very first news received was from No. 1 Ward in town, which has always been good for from 12 to 20 majority for him, but which gave Ingram a majority of 1 this year.

This set the Tories crazy, and when the full returns were made for the town, with only 5 for Wilson, they took possession of everything in sight. The crowd from the country soon began to come in and swell the numbers on the streets, and when it became known Ingram was elected hundreds of torches were lighted, horns of all sizes and shapes appeared as if by magic, and the street was literally jammed with a moving, crazy mass of men and boys. One horn in the procession was about 10 feet long and a foot and a half in diameter. There were smaller horns attached, so nineteen people could send their melodious notes through it at one time. Two immense bouffies were built, and everything in the shape of boxes, barrels, etc., in the business block was piled on for about two hours. The returns from the Dominion were read from the upstairs rooms of the Conservative club and in the town hall by the Reform party. Everything went off peaceably, if not quietly, but the crowd did not disperse until long after midnight.

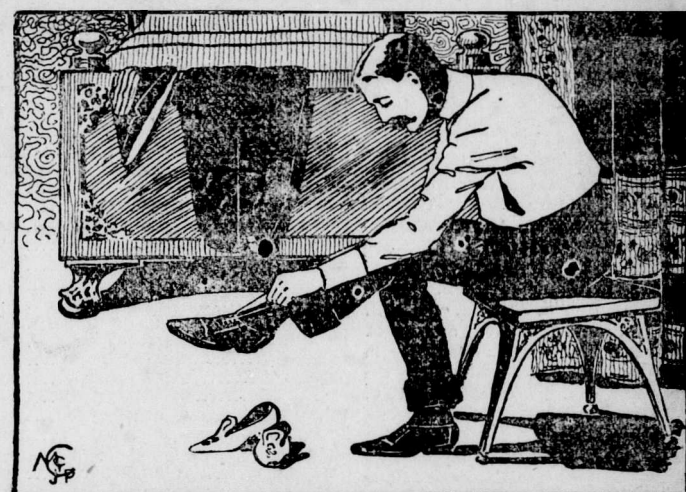
