The Directors beg to submit the eighteenth annual report of the officers of the Society, together with the accounts relating thereto.

The net profits of the Society during the year amount to \$63,156 22. Two half-yearly dividends at the rate of 6 per cent. Per annum have been paid. The sum of ten thousand dellars has been carried to the reserve fund, leaving at the credit of the contingent account the sum of \$40,07711, and which the Directors think should be maintained at sufficient to meet all possible losses.

In estimating the earnings of the Society, no interest has been added for properties on hand, but instead thereof the rents or other income have been taken.

A discussion as to whether the janitors in four city schools should be dismissed, Principal Merchant's report and remarks on affairs at the Collegiate Institute, and Trustee Dewar's motion to appoint Mr. W. J. Carson to the position of the late Inspector Boyle, formed the principal topics for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Education Tuesday night. There were present: Trustee Stephenson (chairman), Cook, McRobert, Craig, Turner, Love, Durdin, Ferguson, Childs, Johnston, Allister, Tanton, Brady, McElheran, Jeffers, Yates, Principal Merchant and Secretary Abbott.

COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE REQUIREMENTS. 1'rincipal Merchant's monthly report showed 352 pupils on the roll from the city, 37 from the county and 1 from outside counties, making a total of 390, the average being 358. He suggested that measures be taken to notify parents of pupils' absence in order to secure a better attendance. As to the equipment for chemical and physical apparati, he found fair provision for the former but the physical was very poor. It would require \$800 or \$900 to put it on a fair basis such as Parkdale and other schools. The gymnasium should be equipped with light gymnastics in the shape of Indian clubs and dumb-bells—he thought such preferable to heavy gymnastics. Supplies should be furnished, such as record books for the teachers by which he might obtain an idea of their work, and also stationery to send parents as notification of their children's absence.

Some discussion arose over the report, Trustee Jeffers speaking strongly on the subject of truancy and suggesting the necessity of preventing it. He had heard Principal Merchant express the cipinion that there were more absent in one day from the Institute here than there would be in a year at Stratford.

Principal Merchant admitted that the

Principal Merchant admitted that the statement was within bounds. He did not attribute it to truancy, but thought parents should be more rigorous in seeing their children attend. To send them a monthly report of their attendance would be helpful.

Trustee Love moved that Mr. Merchant's recommendations be referred to No. 1 excepting as regarded the gymnasium which should go to No. 2. Carried.

Trustee Jeffers, seconded by Trustee Yates, moved that the principal in his monthly report include the names of the all absentees. Carried.

The third clause was laid over until No. 1 Committee's report be brought in.

That a gentleman lived in the city, bought his house here, paid his taxes and carned his salary, was no recommendation in an educational sense. He opposed an appointment at present during the election excitement, as any action taken might be misconstrued, as being due to political pressure.

Trustee Brady moved in amendment that the matter be laid over for a month to give time for consideration.

Trustee Allaster thought it should be settled at once in order to prevent some unpleasant canvassing.

A division was taken on Trustee Brady's motion to defer the matter for a month, and it was carried on the following vote:




