The course of instruction in making early cheese and in operating the Babcock milk tester, now being carried on by the Western Dairymen's Association, is meeting with good results. Five factories in the list already published have been visited. Mr. T. B. Millar, the instructor, in this work, reports a very large attendance of cheese-makers and a large amount of interest taken by them in the work. Mr. Millar is visiting the Vittoria and Attercliffe station factories this week and will visit North Brant and Birr next week.

J. W. Wheaton, secretary of the Western Dairymen's Association, addressed the members of the Ingersoll Cheese Board of Trade on Tresday, referring to some of the questions now being brought before the narkets in refrence to the selling of cheese. Rev. Mr. Wye's Trial.

The trial of Rev. G. W. Wye by the commission appointed by the Bishop of Huron has been in progress at Amherstburg for the past week. The commissioners concluded their labors there on Wednesday and adjourned to London to take the bishop's evidence at 2 p.m. to-day. Rev. Mr. Wye was charged by a portion of the congregation with committing acts unbecoming a person in his position, and that consequently his usefullness is gone. The excitement attending Tuesday evening's debate ended with two members of the opposing factions having a fistic encounter. Mr. Bredin Hall, who sides with the rector, struck J. A. Patten, of the opposition, a severe blow in the face on being called a liar by the latter. This collision took place in the court room after the adjournment and in the presence of the commission and the attorneys.

Asylum Atoms. Government Inspector Tully inspected

the asylum yesterday. A few days ago a couple of the male patients escaped and hired out with a farmer a few miles north of the city. The farmer soon became aware of queer actions on the part of his newly hired men, and becoming suspicious, informed the asylum authorities. When the attendants arrived to take them back, one of the men attempted to use a pitchfork, but was restrained.

Seventy-Nine Dollars a Week.

Mc-Coubrey "was employed on the assessment commissioner's staff for six weeks only.' If the Free Press tells the truth, and the city auditors make correct returns of the salaries paid to the city officials, Assessor McCoubrey, "who was employed for six weeks only," is the best paid civic official in London. On reference to the report of the auditors, dated 1st March, 1894, it is found that "A. McCoubrey, assessor," for his share in compiling the assessment roll recently completed, drew \$475. The Free Press thus asserts that Assessor and Conservative Secretary McCoubrey pocketed as assessor alone \$79 a week! Who authorized the payment?

The auditors, treasurer and collector were also ordered to appear with their papers and books on Friday evening, when another meeting will be held and the audit completed. Councilor Hamilton recommended that Mr. Horn's account for \$10 07 be paid. Mr. Horn had supplied tile for a drain placed across Oak street last year, and there was some dispute whether this year's council was liable for the amount. The recommendation of the board of works will not be carried out, but the matter was sent back for further consideration.
