—Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Tennent and Mrs. D. H. Tennent, city, and the Crozier, London township, have gone to the World's Fair.

—Rev. Alfred Rowland, of Lake Geneva, Wis., has arrived to see his mother who is lying dangerously ill at his residence on Mainland street.

—In celebration of the day of atonement, the holiest in the Jewish calendar, special services will be held in the Jewish places of worship this evening and to-morrow morning.

—The members of the Pickwick Club, witnessed the production of "Starlight" at the Opera House Monday, and afterwards enjoyed a banquet in their rooms on Dundas street.

—Dr. and Mrs. H. S. Ellwood, of Buffalo, N. Y., arrived in the city on Saturday morning by the G. T. R. and are visiting at the residence of the doctor's mother, in the northern portion of the city.

—Dr. P. H. Bryce, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, says that all danger of cholera, reaching Canada this year is past, but this assurance should not cause relaxation in cleanliness.

—The London, Eng., Guardian notes the appointment of Rev. J. W. Payton, curate of Peckridge, to the charge of the new ecclesiastical parish of Peckridge, near the Walden. Rev. Mr. Payton has many relatives in Western Ontario, among whom are A. Martin Watson, Division Court clerk, Thorndale, and W. H. Bartram, barrister, of this city.

—Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Glass left the city yesterday for Detroit, where they will reside in future. A number of friends assembled at the C. P. R. station to say good-bye. Mr. and Mrs. Glass, before leaving, received many handshakes and useful presents. Among the number was a silver tray from Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Pepper, of Guelph. They will visit the World's Fair.

—A big train came in on the G. T. R. yesterday from Berlin. This is German Day at the Western Fair, and the train brought a big crowd as well as the excellent Berlin Military Band. Two German peasants attracted a good deal of attention. They were dressed in the native garb. A number of the most prominent citizens of Berlin came with the excursion.

—There was a lively runaway at the corner of Richmond and Mill streets yesterday. A horse attached to a cart at C. S. Hyman & Co's tannery ran away and collided with the gate at the Mill street entrance, upsetting the cart. The horse fell and was captured on the flagstone sidewalk in front of the Grand Pacific Hotel. The damage was very slight.

—The G. T. R. report that the number of passengers coming to the city over that road to-day is not far short of, if not equal to, the business of the corresponding day last year. Special trains were run on the London, Huron and Bruce, from Berlin, Cayuga, Stratford, Brantford and other points. Berlin and Waterloo county sent a splendid delegation, as did the towns along the Huron and Bruce.

—A quiet wedding took place in St. Paul's Church yesterday morning when Mr. W. H. Forest, local freight agent, C. P. R., was united in marriage to Miss Mary J. Orrell (formerly of London, Ont.), Rev. E. P. Flewelling officiating. The bride was given away by her brother, Mr. H. Orrell, and only a few intimate friends and relatives of the parties were present. Mr. and Mrs. Forest left by the Atlantic express to spend the honeymoon in Portland and the Sound cities. (Vancouver (B. C.) News of Sept. 12.

The Masonic church parade on Sunday next promises to be very largely attended. Brethren will be present from all the surrounding lodges. An Old Settler Dead.

Monday another old settler, in the person of Mrs. Elizabeth Pope, wife of John W. Pope, passed away at her residence, Wellington road, this city. Mrs. Pope was married in Kentucky over 50 years ago. She and her husband came to Canada and settled in London in the spring of 1855.

Three sons, besides her husband, survive her. They are: Charles, ex-detective, city; and now in the employ of the Pullman Car Company; John, a tailor, of Chicago, who served his apprenticeship in this city 30 years ago with John M. Denton; and Fred, who lives in Kansas City. Deceased was in her 81st year, a consistent Christian, and a member of the Horton Street Baptist Church, of which denomination she has been a faithful member for 68 years. She was well-known by all in her neighborhood as a kind, generous, loving person, ever ready to help and assist those in sickness or distress.

The Police Court.

There was the usual fair docket at the Police Court yesterday. Disorderly conduct, drunkenness and vagrancy were the charges.

John F. Campbell, who claims to have jewelry for sale at the Fair, was arrested as a vagrant and remanded until Friday.

John Gavin, on a charge of being disorderly in South London, was remanded for a week.

John Connors was charged with vagrancy. Chief Williams said he never worked only when in jail and then only when he did so to escape punishment. He had also two names, according to the chief, who was promptly informed in return that he was a "liar." Connors claimed to be a painter by trade. He was sentenced to six months in the Central Prison.

Two drunks were discharged, one fined \$5 or ten days, one \$10 or 20 days and one \$2 or a week.
