TORONTO, March 20—11 p.m.—The
low pressure in the Northwest yester-
day has been transferred to-night
to the upper lake district. Fair,
colder weather and higher pressure has
followed in the Northwest. The pressure
is decreasing over Ontario, but continues
high in Eastern Canada, with fair weather.

MR. CURRY'S CASE.

Toronto Young Conservatives Decide to
Let It Alone.

TORONTO, March 20.—At the weekly
meeting of the Young Conservative As-
sociation to-night the executive rendered
a decision in the Curry case. Mr. Curry,
a member of the association, was alleged
to belong also to the Continental Club—a
organization for the propagation of annexa-
tion doctrine—and the question had been
raised whether he had not thereby forfeited
his right to membership in the Conserva-
tive Association.

The executive declared they were asked
to decide who might or who might not be a
supporter of the Conservative party and de-
clared to do so as they did not consider
the club the dictator of the Conservative
party of Canada. This decision apparently
gave satisfaction, as a prominent member
followed it up with a moving vote of want
of confidence in the executive, but the
matter was taken out to the time limited
and no action taken.

—The Franks property at Springbank
has been purchased for \$1,000 by the water
commissioners. It comprises 194 acres

being forthcoming to justify any other
course.

—Mr. Sharpe Butterfield, of Windsor, has
charge of the wine department in connec-
tion with Ontario's exhibit at the World's

field, of Sandwich, by mistake in a previous
issue.

The statement is made that the L. and
P. S. R. bonds, which London proposes
paying from St. Thomas, are in the hands
of the Canada Southern Railway Company,
held in security for a debt. If so, no doubt
they can be recovered when necessary.

—Last Sunday afternoon the men's meet-
ing in the Y. M. C. A. parlors was ad-
dressed by Mr. A. McPherson, of London,
on the subject of "Personal Work." The
address was one which cannot but prove
helpful to all who heard it.—(Pictorial Ad-
vertiser.)

—While Mr. James Crawford, humane
officer, was preparing to retire last night,
he was seized with a fainting fit, which at
the time was thought to be a paralytic
stroke. On medical aid being summoned,
however, it was found that the spell was
the result of biliousness, and in a short
time Mr. Crawford had entirely recovered.

—Deep interest was manifested in the
meetings held by the Christian Workers in
their hall on Richmond street. Rev. A.
W. Rolfe spoke Sunday evening to a large
crowd. Mr. Rolfe is working hard to make
the meetings both interesting and profit-
able to all, and he is pleased to note the
spirit of unity that exists among the
Christians of the many denominations who
have thus far taken a delight in helping on
the work by their co-operative efforts.

—The three-mile race at Westminster
Rink last night was contested by Charles
Griffith and John Ferguson, the leaders in
former races. Both skates in fine form,
although the ice was slow. Ferguson won
the race, coming within half a lap of his
competitor, who was handicapped three
laps. This lad, who has been trained by
Griffith, has now won three consecutive
races, and is proving himself a speedy
skater.

—Capt. Mark Berry's vessel, the H. P.
Murray, during the recent flood at Port
Stanley, suffered considerable damage. The
captain places his loss at least \$500, and
threatens entering action against the party
and parties who were the means of causing
the jam by allowing the pine spruce to lie at
the entrance of the harbor, preventing the
passage of the ice to the lake. The H. P.
Murray was thrown up on the piers and
wrecked so badly that she will have to be
put on the dry dock either at Cleveland or
Detroit.

—My Colleen," the story of an Irish
housewife, which was last year so favor-
ably received in London, will again be seen
here to-morrow (Wednesday) night. The
play is unlike any of the present Irish
dramas, the author having successfully
wandered from the beaten paths so often
traversed by writers of Irish plays. Tony
Farrell, a comedian of exceptional merit, a
singer endowed with a pure tenor voice and
an actor with the magnetism of the late J.
K. Emmet, will be seen in the role of Jerry
Doyle, portraying a natural, whole-souled
son of Erin.

with the aid of a favorable breeze reached
the main portion of the house. The damage
amounted to about \$900, and is covered by
insurance. The family had all retired and
are unable to account for the small con-
flagration which aroused them from their
slumbers.

large company and the gorgeous costumes
will be very heavy, but as the people
of Woodstock know by reputation and ex-

success. This will be the first appearance
of the organization in that bustling place.
It is expected that the city engagement
will be in the following week. The first
part this year will be entirely novel,
special scenery having been imported from
New York.

Wilson Attempts to Escape.
Within the last few months there have
been several rumors of attempted escapes
on the part of John Burke and Thomas
Wilson, who are confined in the county
jail awaiting trial for the murder of
Detective Harry Phair. The prisoners
were removed some time ago to separate
cells in different parts of the building, and
every movement was cautiously watched.

It was found two weeks ago that Wilson,
the most desperate of the two, was filing
the bars of the door of his day cell and the
bars on the window of his night cell. A
diligent search for the file was made, but
it was not found until yesterday. A piece
of plaster was noticed to be loose just
above the wainscoting of the cell. The
plaster was removed and just behind the
wainscoting the file was found. The pris-
oner had removed the plaster as he time
piece and put it back whole each time he
hid the file. The both prisoners will be
watched closer than ever goes without say-
ing.

How the file was procured it is im-
possible to tell. Wilson claims that he did
not get it from any outside agent, but that
he found it while working in a disused cell.

opening the cooking class yesterday
ladies began to arrive in order to secure
good seats, and that the interest is increas-
ing was proved by the unusually large

various dressings were prepared, beginning
with mayonnaise, Mrs. Ewing meanwhile in
her own inimitable manner explaining care-
fully each step in the process, and there
was quite an ordinary edibles the "most
perfectly delicious" chicken, shrimp, po-
tato, apple, orange, pine apple and grape
salads were offered for the delectation of
the various ladies present. The chairman
then treated each in turn, many saying:
"This is the best lesson yet given, if one
could be best where all are so good."
