Toronto, Oct. 30, 8 p.m.—Fine weather continues from Manitoba to the Maritime Provinces, but in the Northwest Territories it has been somewhat cooler today, and local showers have been reported. Present indications point to a change to cooler weather in Ontario and Western Quebec Friday night. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 46-48; Calgary, 50-52; Edmonton, 30-32; Qu'Appelle, 32-48; Winnipeg, 42-54; Port Arthur, 48-50; Pelly Sound, 50-70; Toronto, 48-64; Ottawa, 50-67; Montreal, 62-70; Quebec, 34-48; Halifax, 32-36. Local temperature—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Wednesday, Oct. 30, were 72 and 48. Today (Thursday) the sun rose at 6:51 a.m. and sets at 5:11 p.m. The moon rises at 9:05 p.m. and sets at 11:15 a.m.

WERE WEDDED IN BALTIMORE.

Mr. Chas. Macbeth, formerly of London, and Miss Madge Lyons Made One.

The Sunday Morning Sun of Baltimore, Md., contains the following announcement: "The marriage of Miss Maggie Lyons, daughter of Mrs. B. Maifit Lyons, to Mr. Charles William Macbeth, formerly of London, Canada, but now of Detroit, took place at 6 o'clock last evening at the Forest Inn, Walkbrook. The event was one of much interest, as the bride has not only been much admired socially since making her debut, two winters ago, but is also widely known for her musical abilities. The groom is a son of Lieut.-Col. Macbeth, of London, Canada. In his profession of civil engineer he is now engaged in the construction of the longest proposed electric railway in this country—that to run from Detroit to Chicago. He is a graduate of the science department of the University of Toronto, and a prominent member of the Kappa Alpha fraternity. The entire court scene of the wedding was yellow, the brilliant hue harmonizing most becomingly with the rich brunette beauty of the bride. All of the apartments thrown open were lavishly decorated with white, pink, palms, yellow chrysanthemums and yellow wax lights. The bride wore a lovely gown of white point d'esprit over white satin, a tulle veil attached by a coronet of orange blossoms and pearl ornaments. She carried a shower bouquet of white roses and lilies of the valley. She was followed by her brother, Mr. Philip Douglas Lyons. The maid of honor and only attendant of the bride was her sister, Miss Nathalie P. EIGHT DOLLARS FOR A CENT.

Boston, Oct. 31.—At the sale of a collection of coins, the principal item was a collection of United States copper cents from 1793 to 1857, inclusive, containing 133 specimens, all different. Collins, a Boston collector, got the lot for \$200. A 1793 cent sold for \$3. The half cents brought even higher prices, proofs of 1840 and 1848 going for \$20 each, and a proof of 1849 selling for \$24. An uncirculated \$3 gold piece of 1875 went to a Philadelphia dealer for \$155. An octagonal \$5 gold piece, minted in San Francisco in 1852, went to a New York dealer for \$26.

SAYS WIFE QUIT HIM

Windsor Police Will Not Charge Clement With Bigamy.

Windsor, Oct. 31.—Chief of Police Willis says he will not press the charge of bigamy against Thomas Clement, who pleaded guilty to robbing Wigle's hardware store. The chief thinks that the Hamilton authorities should push that charge if anything is done in the case.

Clement says he was driven from his wife in England. He claims that on being all his money, some \$15,000, in business, his wife deserted him, taking her two daughters with her. She set up housekeeping and tried to make a living by keeping boarders. When he sought her she said: "I never want to see your face again." Taking her at her word he sailed for Canada. Meeting Miss Jennie Trout in Hamilton he married her twelve years ago. He is 51 years of age.

Questions Answered.

CITIZEN.—If the city grades a street or lane, and exposes the fence posts 16 or 20 inches above the level of said grading, at whose expense should it be to put it in proper order again? Live Items Culled for Busy People's Information.

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George Skimin died at his home in Gratiot county, Mich., on Monday, of cancer of the stomach, aged 71 years. Deceased came to Canada when he was a child. He was married to Ann Jane Jamieson, in Brantford.

As a result of the small number of men who turned out on Sunday afternoon to participate in the church parade of the 21st (Essex) Regiment, at Windsor, there promises to be interesting police court developments. Col. Gullor laid an information against Victor Raper, a member of the regiment, charging him with openly refusing to obey the command to turn out in the church parade.

It is probable, says a Toronto dispatch, that a meeting of those interested in the organization of the proposed new Canadian Order of Railway Trainmen will be held in Ottawa on Nov. 20, when it is hoped to establish what will be known as a grand division. Advantage is expected from having one corporate body to deal with the affairs of the railway men, and from having the organization purely Canadian.

Mr. D. Cantelon, the well-known apple shipper, recently bought the orchard of Mr. A. C. Attwood, of Evergreen Hill Fruit Farm. Before buying the orchard, he estimated the fruit on the trees at 25 barrels. Mr. Attwood, previous to picking, estimated them at 350 barrels. The result, after picking, was a total of 52 barrels, half-way between the two estimates, which proved that both are good judges of apples on the trees. Estimates are closely to each other and to the final result.

The first annual combination sale of pure-bred sheep at Chicago was held at Dexter Park some ten days ago. Some 450 fine animals were disposed of, including Shropshires from Richard Gibson and Robert Taylor, of London; Leicesters from C. S. & W. V. Nevins, of Chiles, Kan., and Ramboulllets, Maple Lodge, Ont., and Davidsburg, Mich. and Shaw & Baden, of Marquette, Mich. The highest bid for a Ramboulllet ram, a number of Shropshires brought \$20 per head, and from this price ran down to \$1.

County Physician Johnson, of Detroit, made a curious discovery in examining the body of Louis Vay (Gentien), an old watch repairer, of Chatham, Ont., who was found in Brooklyn avenue and Abbott street, Saturday night, in a dying condition. Coroner Hoffman demanded a post-mortem examination, although the physicians who were called, said they thought the man's death was probably due to the fact that he had been drinking. It is thought that he had become dizzy and fallen, striking his head on the pavement, and thus breaking his neck.
