WAGNER'S "RULE BRITANNIA"

Rights Secured to Production of the Opera Recently Found.

London, Oct. 18.—Wagner's long lost "Rule Britannia," recently discovered at Leicester is to be produced. Frau Wagner has set aside her own wishes that the youthful work of her husband should remain unpublished and has granted the rights of performance and publication to Metzger & Co.

As known, is remarkable. The preliminary sketch, which is in the archives at Baireuth, bears the date of 1836, but the overture was composed at Konigsberg, March, 1837. It was performed once there and once in Riga under Wagner's own direction. Passed through London in 1839, Wagner handed over the score to the Philharmonic Society with the hope that it would be performed, a hope which, however, was not realized.

The manuscript was returned to Wagner's lodgings and the landlord forwarded it to Paris without paying the postage. Wagner refused to pay the "heavy" fee because, having "the

orchestral parts in his possession, he was independent. But these parts were destroyed when the Dresden Opera House was burned in 1869. What eventually became of the returned package containing the original manuscript and how it came into the possession of a man named Thomas at Leicester, together with a truck load of other manuscript music, remains a mystery.

One of the most remarkable places of worship in the world is the miners' chapel in Myndd Menigdd colliery, Swansea, Wales. It is close to the bot-

BOUGHT FORTY SHIPS

The Czar Becomes Owner of North German Lloyd Boats.

London, Oct. 20.—A sensation was caused in shipping circles here today by a report that 40 steamships of the North German Lloyd Company, including several crack liners, had been sold to Russia through a third party, and that the Lloyd Company had chartered 40 ships to replace them.

Japan is said to have a knowledge of the transaction, and a vehement protest is expected. The Lloyd Company in Berlin denies the report.

171-2 TO THE ACRE

Manitoba and Northwest Will Yield 59,000,000 Bushels Wheat.

Winnipeg, Oct. 20.—The Northwest Grain Dealers' Association today issued their annual crop report. The average yield of wheat for the entire Northwest Territories is given as 17½ bushels per acre of 3,420,411, making the total yield of wheat 59,000,000 bushels. The yield of oats is nearly 45,000,000, with average yield per acre of 37 bushels. The barley crop is 10,500,000 bushels, average yield per acre being 26½. The flax crop amounts to slightly over 600,000 bushels, average yield per acre 11½, and the percentage of threshing done is given as 65. Seven million bushels of this year's wheat crop has been inspected and passed Winnipeg.

THE MANUFACTURERS

Arranged to Meet Delegates From Trades and Labor Congress.

Toronto, Oct. 20.—The business left over from the Montreal convention of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association was wound up at the first meeting of the executive council here today. Outside members were present from Brantford, Guelph, Galt, Windsor and other places. W. K. George, president-elect, presided, and 35 new members were accepted. In a resolution committee report was presented on the resignation of Hon. A. G. Blair. Among the letters received was one from Hon. B. H. McCarthy, of Trinidad, who was present at the Montreal convention, and who outlined a scheme with regard to the increase of Canadian West Indian trade. A committee was appointed to select representatives of the association who will meet the representatives of the trades and labor congress, R. J. Pounce, general secretary, and W. H. D. Miller, manager of transportation, were re-engaged for another year. The council passed a resolution of condolence to the family of the late Hon. J. F. Stairs, of Halifax.

London, Oct. 21.—The India office announces that the Amer of Afghanistan proposes to send his eldest son to meet Lord Curzon of Kedleston on his return to India, and will receive, at Kabul, an official sent by the Indian Government authorized to discuss with the Amer questions concerning the relations between the two Governments.

DEATH IN FRENCH HEEL

Lady Trips and Falls Over Balustrade Five Stories.

New York, Oct. 21.—Tripping on a stair landing by the French heel of her slipper, Mrs. Emma Latassa fell over a fifth story balustrade in an apartment house in East Fifth street, and was instantly killed. Mrs. Latassa and Mrs. Osa Gauvey were walking arm in arm in the hall, and when the former fell she carried her companion with her. Mrs. Gauvey suffered a fractured skull, shoulder and other injuries, and it is believed she will die.

Canuta H. Latassa, husband of the dead woman, was arrested, but the police say they believe he is in no way to blame for the accident.

Star Found by Woman.

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 21.—Miss Henrietta S. Leavitt, of the Harvard astronomical staff, has just discovered a new variable star of the Algol type. These stars are rare. This one is in the region of Sagittarius, and was noted on photographic plates. The main feature of the star is its sudden comparative drop in brightness. It remains obscured for a short period, returning to its normal magnitude. The obscuration generally is repeated at intervals of a few days.

Girl is a Master Mariner.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 21.—Having passed an examination before the local United States steamship inspectors, Miss Jane Morgan, daughter of Randall Morgan, one of Philadelphia's financiers, is now entitled to rank as a "master mariner" and command her father's steam yacht Waturus. Her license reads "for all oceans and she could command an ocean liner as well.
