During the last twenty years, Nitt holds, though emigration has increased by leaps and bounds, the mortality rate has diminished, and the population has grown over 4,500,000; yet commerce of very kind, both at home and abroad, has certainly not kept pace therewith. Such progress as can be traced in the last decade has caused such sacrifices of strength and burdens of taxation as appear in no other European state. While 1904 marks the high water level in Italian exports and imports, it likewise marks a notable decadence in the principal industries, for which South Italy, with its poorest provinces is so famous. A telling example is the rapid decline for the sulphur trade, due to the Louisville exports, and the average of wealth in Italian banks is the lowest in the world. The scale of motor force employed in

all Italian industries is not equal to that used in a single English or American industry alone. The consumption of fusil coal is still almost nil. Nitti deems that a terrible mistake is being made that Italians at this juncture should court the praise of others or waste energy in questionable boasts. Instead of its economic crisis being passed, Prof. Nitti regards it as threatening as ever.
