YEAR BOOK OF CITY OF LONDON

Some Very Interesting Information Gleaned By Mr. Samuel Baker.

A LITTLE LOCAL HISTORY

Mayors of the City From 1855—Lon don Has 134 Miles of Streets— Other Features.

City Clerk Baker has recently issued a little booklet, which will make reading of the most interesting nature for citizens of London.

The booklet shows that at the present time London has 134 miles of streets, while the city comprises 4,478 acres made up as follows: Ward 1, 1, 240 acres; ward 2, 1,013 acres; ward 3, 1,030 acres, and ward 4, 1,198 acres.

London has 145 miles of cement walks, 51 miles of interal sewers, 13½ miles of trunk sewers, 31 miles of cement curb gutter. The number of feet of streets payed under the general tax is as follows: Bitulithic 14,656, asphalt 24,580, brick 5,483, tar macadam 3,834, broken stone 6,040, asphalt block 1,600 making a total of more than 10 miles.

It is interesting to note the influence of the food supply on man protectively of the tood supply of man in causing a condition closely resembling hibernation. For instance, there is in Russia a certain class of peasants who suffer from a chronic state of familine which becomes more acute at the end of the year-more or less severe according to circumstances. In these cases, when the head of the family sees, toward the end of autumn, that by a normal consumption of their supply of wheat it will not last the family through the winter he makes arrangements to diminish the rations as much as possible. Knowing that it will be difficult to preserve their health and keep up the physical force necesary for their work in the spring, he and his family plunge themselves into a condition known as "lejka," which means that everybody simply goes to bed, lying down on the top of the flat stove, and there they stay during the four or five months of winter. They get up, during this time, only to replenish the fire, eat a small pleec of black bread and take a small drink of water. The peasant and his family try to move as little as possible and sleep as much as they can—stretched out on the stove top they preserve almost complete himmobility. Their only care during the long winter is to keep down the body metabolism, to waste as little as possible of their animal heat, and for that reason they try to eat and drink less, move less, and generally to reduce the activities of their bodies. Their instinct commands them to sleep as much as possible—obscurity and silence reign in the hut where, in the warmest place, either singly or crowded, the occupants pass the winter season in a condition closely resembling hibernation.


