"The Toronto Sufffage Association earnestly pleads for a speedy commutation of the death sentence passed on Angelina Napolitano, since every addition of terror, anticipating her execution on Aug. 9, cannot but react in a deleterious manner upon her unborn innocent child."

They further hold that the woman's condition at the time at which she committed the crime aggravated the sentence of provocation received and they, therefore, earnestly hope that the sentence of death will be commuted to one of imprisonment, and that this decision be communicated to her as soon as possible.

The association sincerely hope that all societies and individuals throughout the country who feel that this unfortunate foreign woman should not, owing to the circumstances surrounding her case, suffer the extreme penalty of the law, will in some manner make their desire known to the minister of justice.
