DISEASE TESTED

Expected to Return in a Few Weeks to See Result of the Demonstration.

Montreal, March 11 .- Dr. Friedrich ranz Friedman, the Berlin physiian whose treatment for tuberculosis has drawn upon him the eyes of medical scientists and the general public the world over, today demonstrated his method on 56 patients at the Royal Edward Institute, in the presence of a representative gathering of physicians.

The Test Cases.

The cases selected represented the hree main divisions of tubercular into well-advanced cases of several years' duration.

The youngest patient treated was 14-months-old baby girl, and the oldest was a man of about 50, and be tween these extremes both sexes and all ages were represented. Most of without assistance and to stand while the treatment was given, but for a mostly children, an operating was found necessary.

In every case an intravenous injecon of the serum was made in the patient's arm, while in a number an intra-muscular injection was made in the hip. The amount of serum injected was varied by Dr. Friedman to suit the varying conditions of each individual case as indicated by the history cards, but Dr. Friedman did not explain to the professional men present his method of gauging the quantity of serum administered.

One of the most interesting cases presented was that of the 14-months-old girl who had been a sufferer for about two months from tuberculosis of the lungs and of the knee. The vein of the arm was so tiny that Dr. Friedman found it impossible to make the usual intravenous injection, and he performed the rarely-attempted operation on 80 young a child of inserting the needle in a vein of the neck, while in case he also made the extra injection in the hip. The little one bore the ordeal well, and Dr. Friedman remarked in a confident tone that its complete recovery might be expected

TORONTO, March 11.—The run at the Union stockyards today totalled 125 cars, with 2,282 cattle, 111 calves, 215 sheep and lambs, 896 hogs and 36 horses. A good, strong demand was shown for live stock at the market here, and trading was active, although no material increase in cattle prices was reported. Choice and good butchers were especially well received, and in several instances extra fine animals brought as high as \$7 25. The buyers intended opening the hog market by paying \$9 60 for fed and watered stock, but quotations were slightly higher, standing at \$9 65, and in some cases at \$9 70. The run of swine was smaller even than usual, only 896-head being received at the yards. The supply of sheep and lambs was also short last week, and today the receipts showed no increase whatlambs was also short last week, and today the receipts showed no increase whatever. 
