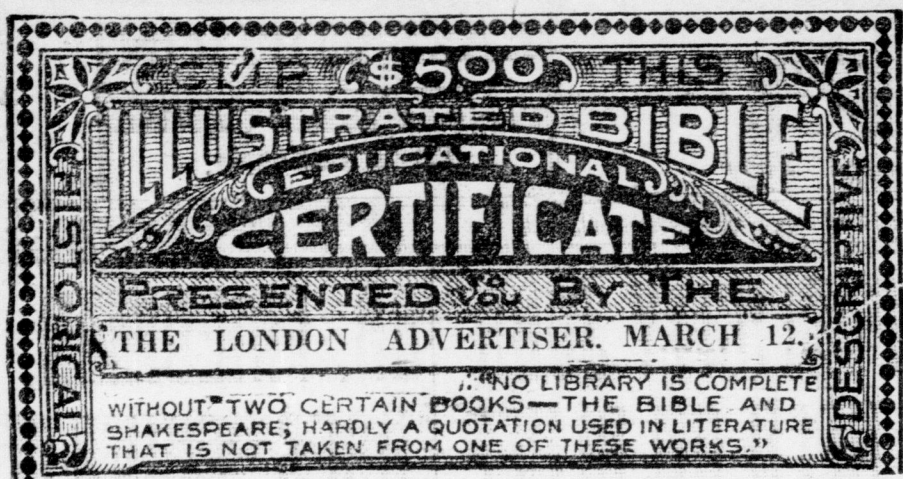




Minister Is Still Absent; Charges Are Again Postponed

Investigation of Alleged Hochelaga By-Election Crookedness May Come Up in House Thursday—Hon. Mr. Coderre Ill in Montreal Hospital.

Ottawa, March 11.—Hon. Louis Coderre, secretary of state, was again absent today from the House of Commons, and in consequence the charges in connection with the Hochelaga by-election, which Mr. Gauthier was prepared to proceed with yesterday, were further postponed by the Government. Mr. Coderre, it is said, is ill in a Montreal hospital, suffering from a nervous breakdown. It is understood, however, that his illness is not serious and his friends anticipate that he will be able to resume his Parliamentary duties in a day or so.

ROUGH TIME FOR MILITANTS

Suffragettes Handled Severely by Mob at Nottingham.

FACES SCRATCHED FINERY RUINED

Showers of Rotten Fruit and Vegetables Hurlled at Speakers on the Platforms.

Nottingham, England, March 11.—The militant suffragettes, against whom the people have turned, and who have been having a hard time recently, were tonight driven from a hall by the wildest crowd they have yet encountered. Annie Kenney and a male suffragist named Gray were announced as the principal speakers at the meeting. Police protection for the meeting was asked for beforehand, for while a policeman who defends the people from suffragette violence is a ruffian and coward, he must always be ready to shield the sacred persons of the militant suffragettes.

The Nottingham police accepted this duty and turned out in great force. Admission to the hall was by ticket, but a number of trouble-makers got into the hall early before the ticket takers had arrived. A great crowd surrounded the hall and jeered the ticket-holders as they entered.

The first speaker had hardly begun to speak when a detonator was discharged in the back seats. This caused terrible alarm. The explosion was followed by stamping and hooting and the setting off of firecrackers.

Miss Kenney tried to speak, but was heckled about the burning of two or three railway stations yesterday. She answered that the suffragettes had been compelled to resort to extreme measures, but that Nottingham men ought to be proud of such actions inasmuch as their ancestors had burned Nottingham Castle in order to get the franchise.

The descendants of these historic firebugs were not convinced by this statement and resumed the racket within the hall. Meanwhile the crowd outside raised a tremendous din, and tried to force an entrance to the hall. The police held their

DR. FRIEDMAN TREATS FIFTY AT MONTREAL

Number Inoculated There the Largest Outside the German Capital.

EVERY STAGE OF DISEASE TESTED

Expected to Return in a Few Weeks to See Result of the Demonstration.

Montreal, March 11.—Dr. Friedrich Franz Friedman, the Berlin physician whose treatment for tuberculosis has drawn upon him the eyes of medical scientists and the general public the world over, today demonstrated his method on 56 patients at the Royal Edward Institute, in the presence of a representative gathering of physicians.

The most distinctive feature of the demonstration was the fact that Dr. Friedman treated so large a proportion of the 90 odd cases presented to him by Dr. E. S. Harding and his colleagues of the medical board of the institute. The patients so presented were selected from a list of several hundred who applied personally or through their physicians for treatment, and the medical board in making their selection were guided by a desire to secure cases typical of every class and every stage of the disease, with the exception that cases so advanced as to be hopeless were rejected.

Fifty-Six Treated.
The number treated, 56, is by far the largest ever inoculated in one day or in one city by Dr. Friedman outside of Berlin, only 28 cases in all receiving the virus in the United States.

Dr. Friedman reached Montreal this morning at 8 o'clock, coming direct from New York. He was met at the Bonaventure station by Lieut.-Col. Burland, who extended the invitation which brought the German physician to Montreal, and Professor George Adams, who bore Lieut.-Col. Burland's invitation to New York. After breakfast with Lieut.-Col. Burland, Dr. Friedman accompanied Dr. Adams to the McGill College laboratories, where he prepared the serum which he later used in his treatments.

The Test Cases.
The cases selected represented the three main divisions of tubercular infection—pulmonary, glandular and bone or joint infection, and ranged from the early stages of the disease to well-advanced cases of several years' duration.

The youngest patient treated was a 14-month-old baby girl, the oldest was a man of about 50, and between these extremes both sexes and all ages were represented. Most of the patients were able to walk without assistance and to stand while the treatment was given, but for a few, mostly children, an operating table was found necessary.

In every case an intravenous injection of the serum was made in the patient's arm, while in a number an additional intra-muscular injection was made in the hip. The amount of serum injected was varied by Dr. Friedman to suit the varying conditions of each individual case as indicated by the history cards, but Dr. Friedman did not explain to the professional men present his method of gauging the quantity of serum injected.

One of the most interesting cases presented was that of the 14-month-old girl who had been a sufferer for about two months from tuberculosis of the lungs and fragments of the knee. The vein of the arm was so tiny that Dr. Friedman found it impossible to make the usual intravenous injection, and he performed the young child by inserting the needle in a vein of the neck, while in this case he also made the extra injection in the hip. The little one bore the ordeal well, and Dr. Friedman remarked in a confident tone that its complete recovery might be expected.

May Return in a Month.
No definite arrangements have yet been made for further administration of the treatment, but it is possible that Dr. Friedman will himself return to Montreal in the course of a month or five weeks to again treat these cases, or else send his assistant, Dr. Benjamin, here for that purpose.

Dr. Friedman does not claim that any miraculous effects will manifest themselves immediately in the subjects treated.
