Some 250 Middlesex Farmers Who Spent Day at Guelph Receive Good Tips.

DR. CREELMAN WELCOMES

Big Turnout of Farmers' Sons Feature of Excursion to Model Farm.

The East Middlesex Farmers' Institute neld a most successful Guelph O. A. C. excursion yesterday, when more than 250 of its members "knocked off" work to take in the annual trip to the Royal City

A feature of the excursion was number of farmers' sons present. vould seem that the farmers of the district are beginning to realize that much useful agricultural information is to be gained by a visit to the college this time of the year.

"We couldn't have had a better day," said W B. Harding, of Thorndale, president of the institute, to The Advertiser reporter who accompanied the excursion "I take these trips every year, and never fail to bring home ideas and information that have meant money to me. They always treat us splendidly at the college, and it is a treat to see the way the grounds are kept."

The excursionists arrived at the colthe south end of Rectory street, and lege just in time for dinner, and after Dr. G. C. Creelman's address of welcome they did ample justice to the lunch served in the college gymnasium.

Directly after lunch 90 per cent of the farmers followed Prof. W. J. Squirrel, of the field husbandry department, to the 75 acres of experimental plots. Each plot is 1-100th of an acre in gize, the soil being the average Ontario clay loam, having about the same rotation as the average farm. The visitors were taken up the centre road, and the principal objects of the experiments were 100 varieties of winter wheat, the three best being Amer ican Baume, American Wonder and Dawson's Golden City.

Professor Squirrel explained that the spring wheat crop has decreased very largely in Ontario during the last fifteen years, at one time a half milion acres being grown, while at present there were not more than one hundred thousand under cultivation. "This change is due to the change in crop rotation, the fact that spring wheat can be raised more economically in western Canada, and that winter wheat outyielded spring wheat in On-

The farmers were shown over 20 varieties of alfalfa being grown, hardiest and most productive being Grimms, Ontario variegated, and sand. Next the three plant breeding ranges were visited. The plant breeding at Guelph is the most extensive car-ried on in America. The field husbandry department has records of 100,000 plants that are hybrids and selections. The principal new varieties produced from plant breeding are: O. A. C., No. 21, barley; O. A. C., No. 72, oats; O. A. C., No. 3, oats (early) and O. A. C., No. 61, rye. All these varieties

are outgrowing the standard varieties grown in the province. The majority of the live stock was out on pasture and was not inspected. The new dairy barn proved to be very interesting, being fitted up with all the latest devices and model in every
