Chicago, Ill., Jan. 14.—Speedy determination of the injunction proceedings instituted by the Federal League, to prevent organized baseball from interfering with its operations and play, is expected when the case is opened for trial next Wednesday before Judge Edwards in the United States district

Both officials of the Federals and the leaders of the organized forces are agreed on this point, it was learned today. They expressed the opinion that the case will be decided in ample time to allow the clubs of the three leagues to start their spring training trips without any danger that a court verdict may disarrange plans for the championship season.
