Hammett Places All Blame On Architect For Faulty Houses

Provincial Inspector's Report Confirms All the Statements Made by Inspector Piper-Declares Houses Are Not Perfect, But Claims They Are "Not Falling Down" -Commissioner Tallant's Complaints Are Fully Justified.

The report of E. W. Hammett, provincial housing inspector, who visited London last week under instructions from J. A. Ellis, housing director for Ontario, and inspected dwellings erected for the London Housing Commission on Pine Lawn and Garfield avenue, was received by City Clerk S. Baker this morning. While Director Ellis states that he grants permission for publication of the report, the housing commission has instructed that its contents be regarded as confidential by civic officials until it is discussed at a meeting of that body.

HOUSES NOT PERFECT.

This report declares that the houses are not "falling down," which statement did not require a special trip from Toronto to verify, as any citizen is aware of this fact. However, the report bears out the allegations of Commissioner D. J. Tallant, whose complaints brought about the investigation, in that Inspector Hammett says "the houses are not perfect," and places the blame on Architect McBride, who was employed by the commission.

Blames the Architect.
The report practically coincides with that of Building Inspector A. M. Piper, published exclusively in The Advertiser Tuesday, the only points of difference being that the onus is cast on Mr. McBride by the Toronto inspector, and that his report is "milder" than that of Inspector Piper. "The architect could have remedied the defects," according to the report, which an official declared, "is as mild as it could possibly be put."

Principal Faults.

Regarding the Pine Lawn houses the report declares:

1. That the shingles used on the roofs of the 41 Pine Lawn houses are inferior to the Brantford shingles, called for inspecifications. This is the chief defect found by the provincial inspector, who blames Architect McBride
