Three-Cornered Contests Will Take Place-1,442 Seek Seats.

LLOYD GEORGE ACTIVE

Declares Premier's Song of Victory Is Played On Triangle.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Eng., Nov. 26.-Lloyd George's gift for apt phrases and political catchwords is serving the reunited Liberal party well, while his extraordinary energy in campaigning shows not the slightest diminution. Speaking at Edinburgh today he alluded to Premier Baldwin's prediction on Saturday that "The people

will win." "That," said Lloyd George, "is not his confidence. The premier's hope is that the people will be beaten by triangular contests. His song of vic-

tory is played on the triangle."

This was an allusion to the fact that there will be two hundred or ore such "three-cornered" contests. Curiously enough, formally nominated /today numbered almost exactly the same as those nominated for the last general elec-tion, namely 1,442, distributed as fol-


