"Just Suppose" Produced by

Season's Program.

The London drama league will open the season early in December with the production of a three-act play "Just Suppose." This clever comedy from the pen of A. E. Thomas, will be produced under the direction of Vincent Perry, and several new players will be introduced. Among them will be Basil Morgan, who is playing a strong character part, the marquis of Karnaby. Basil Morgan will be remembered as the winner of the governor-general's medal.
