EAST KOOTENAY NEWS

Good Returns From the Rice Plantations—Recent Discoveries of Ore Deposits—Alleged Indian Outrages—The Ferry Creek Mine—The Kootenay River Bridge.

The mining engineer who has charge of the work on Friday creek is absent in California. The outlook is reported as good, and several small clean-ups have been made.
