The cellars in the lower portion of the city are flooded and great distress is caused amongst the poorer classes. people, whose escape was cut off, were rescued by the police with great difficulty. The tracks of the Harlem railway at Tremont and Fordham have been washed away. The lime in Lyon's yard at Mott Haven was slacked by the rain and fired the building, causing a loss of \$6000.

NEW YORK STATE.

POUOHKEEPSIE, Sept. 23 —The storm is the heaviest known hereabout for years and is still raging. The reports from along the Hudson tell of roads being cut and washed away in every direction. The lowlands are everywhere flooded and in several places bridges have been carried away. The streams, already swollen, are stil rising rapidly and serious damage is feared. Along the Newburg, Dutchess and Connecticut railroad the iron bridge at Connecticut railroad the iron bridge at Verbank is impassible and the New York and New England railroad is badly washed

and New England railroad is oddly washed out near Waterbury.

Port Jervis, Sept. 23—Heavy rain has been falling here since resterday morning. The river is rising fast and trains have been much delayed in the Ramapo valley, where the track is submerged in some places.

Newburgh, Sept. 23—The reports of damage caused by the flood continue to come in. In Cornwall eight or ten bridges were carried away, the damage amounting to \$12,000. At Mountainville a barn and dam carried away a flour mill damaged to the extent about \$2500. Solomon's dock is torn to pieces, loss about \$1000. Many others in Cornwall lose considerable amounts. Many manufacturers in the suburbs have suspended operations, and the damage to their stock is estimated at \$100,000.
