

HEARS BRITISH SOLDIERS KICKED

Earl Winterton Raises Question in the Commons

REPORTS FROM MOROCCO

Harsh Treatment of the Legionnaires Reported

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Great Britain has asked Spain to allow a British representative to proceed to Morocco to make an independent and impartial inquiry into allegations of ill-treatment by Spanish officers of British subjects, who have enlisted in the Spanish foreign legion.

This announcement was made in the Commons to-day by Cecil Harmsworth, undersecretary of state for foreign affairs, in answer to a question by Earl Winterton. The latter asked if the Government were aware of the serious allegations made against Spanish military authorities by British subjects, mostly ex-service men, recently enlisted in the foreign legion, who claim that conditions of pay and service, promised by Spanish consuls here, have not been carried out. Earl Winterton asked further if the Government were aware that some of the British who were protesting, were ill-treated, robbed and sent to Gibraltar, and that others, who actually joined the Legion had been kicked and beaten by Spanish officers.

SENDS MEN TO TRIAL FOR HOLDING PARADE

Labour Men Refused to Give Bond Not to Break Peace Again.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 27.—At the preliminary hearing of the 12 men of the local Trades and Labor Council charged with being members of an unlawful assembly in connection with the recent labor parade held in this city, the magistrate decided to send up the entire 12 for trial.

Defendants, through their counsel, refused to enter into sureties not to commit another breach of the peace on the ground that they were fighting for a principle and that they did not feel they were breaking the law by holding the parade.

FIX NEW RATES FOR PHONES AT BLYTH

BLYTH, Oct. 27.—(Special to The Free Press.)—The subscribers of the Blyth Municipal Telephone System met in Memorial Hall to confer with Francis Dagg, of Toronto, telephone expert, representing the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, relative to a raise in rates to meet operating expenses and to reduce the floating debt, which amounted to a great deal. After considering the question from every standpoint the following rates were arrived at: Fourteen dollars to subscribers whose debenture term has expired, \$16 to subscribers whose debenture term has not yet expired, this to be reduced to \$14 at end of debenture term; \$8 for renters. Any subscriber may withdraw at the end of debenture term by paying his share in cash of accumulated indebtedness, which shall be determined by the board.

RUSHING GRAIN TO HEAD OF THE LAKES

PORT ARTHUR, Oct. 27.—During the first 25 days of October the three transcontinental railways—Canadian Pacific, Canadian National and Grand Trunk Pacific—handled 41,100 cars of grain from the Western wheat fields to Port Arthur and Fort William, according to figures obtained from the statistics department of the board of grain commissioners.

Of the total the Canadian Pacific handled 22,828 cars, the Canadian National 14,893 and the Grand Trunk Pacific 3,413 cars.

DOUBLE CELEBRATION ON ARMISTICE DAY

KNOW MURDERER OF TAXI DRIVER

Toronto Police Say Man Is Former Farm Hand

HAS FLED TO THE STATES

Detectives Believe Motive for Crime Was Robbery

TORONTO, Oct. 27.—(Canadian Press Dispatch.)—The murderer of Harry Strom, taxi driver, who was murdered Saturday night, is known to the city detective department. A warrant will be issued for his arrest.

The man is said to have worked on a farm on North Yonge street some time ago for a period of about two months. He left this position and came down to work for a man not far from Finch's side road, where Strom was murdered. Eleven days he remained at work and prior to severing his connection there left a club bag and a suit case, but returned later to claim them. He was to call on Saturday, but failed to put in an appearance. "Everything in connection with the case points towards this man," declared a police official to-day.

An overcoat believed to have been owned by this man was found in the vicinity and it has been identified by one of his former employers as having been worn by him. The coat is of dark material, with a velvet collar, and is now in the hands of the police.

FARMER CANDIDATE IN S. ONTARIO BACKING UP

OSHAWA, Oct. 27.—Frank M. Chapman, Farmer candidate in South Ontario, in a manifesto issued to-day, promises to give only independent support to the party led by Hon. T. A. Cregar.

He declares that the tariff cry is a bogey, and that no one seriously intends to do away with it. Mr. Chapman

favours a tariff as a weapon of defense so planned that in case any nation places a higher tariff or an embargo against Canada, the Canadian tariff against that country would automatically be increased to meet it. He would also have Government control over the issuing of stocks so as to prevent watering by corporations.

Hon. Wm. Smith, Conservative, and Mr. Chapman are the only candidates in the South Ontario field thus far. The Liberal nominee withdrew and another convention is being held on Saturday afternoon at Whitby to consider the situation.
