The Masonic Grand Lodge of Arkansas, recently adopted a resolution making it a Masonic offense for any member of the order to sign a petition for the granting of a saloon license, or to circulate such a petition. According to laws adopted by the Arkansas Legislature, effective January 1st, a petition signed by a majority of the white adults of a community, is a requisite to the issuance of a license to conduct a saloon. It is considered that such a petition cannot be secured in that state.

The county council has granted \$1000 to protect road at Sydenham Plats, Brooke.

Mrs. Flora Leitch, one of the oldest pioneers of Metcalfe, died last week. She was born in 1827.

Alex. Minicelli, who kept a general store in Waukegan, has purchased a grocery business in Moose Jaw.

Liddle Robson, a Plympton pioneer died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Chris. Wall, on Saturday last in his 80th year.

Three Strathroy merchants were fined \$5 and costs last week by Magistrate Noble for selling adulterated maple syrup.

About one thousand pounds of game was shot within a radius of five miles of Glencoe during the open game season this year.

Some one went in the Florence School from Friday till Monday and cut the school register all to pieces, in fact it is completely destroyed.

The maximum salary of a lady teacher in Strathroy public schools has been raised to \$500. It is necessary to hold the position seven years to secure this.

The county council presented Mr. Herbert Saunders, proprietor of the Northern Hotel, Sarnia, with an address and gold watch as a mark of their respect.

A female detective from the Customs Department is said to be engaged spotting women who have been making purchases of coats and other articles of wear-apparel in Detroit.

Over 100 names have been enrolled in the first cavalry troop in Kent or Essex at Tilbury, under Captain Odette. The Militia Department at Ottawa will be asked to assist in the erection of a suitable armory.

Several of the fancy breeders of live stock in this locality shipped stock to the Guelph fat stock show on Friday, Dec. 5th. Mr. Robert Smith, of Warwick, Hereford; Mr. Peter McEwen, hogs; Mr. Steadman, Clydesdale horses.

Robert Witty, of Point Edward, appeared before police magistrate Fick on Wednesday morning on a charge of selling liquor without a license. He was found guilty and was fined \$150 and costs. The fine and costs were paid.

At a meeting of the Forest Band it was decided to purchase new regulation uniforms for next season. This will mean an expenditure of about \$300, all of which is raised by the individual efforts of the members of that organization, not one dollar being donated by the citizens.

A permanent nurse will be engaged by the Sarnia council of women to care for the injured and sick among the working people whose incomes do not permit of expenditures for medical attention. A subscription fund will be raised to cover the expenses of the nurse and the medicines.

Women in Essex county are so uneasy over the report that female detectives from the customs department are quietly investigating the county in search of women who purchased coats and other articles in Detroit, and carried them over the border that they have quite forgotten the high price of eggs. It is said that the practice is an extensive one, and the department is determined to break it up.
