PROGRESS IN RIFLE SHOOTING.—The victory of the American rifle team at Dollymount, June 27, with a score of 1,292, against 1,280 for their Irish competitors, six shots on each side, shows that the limit of progress in rifle making and in rifle shooting has not yet been reached. This may be safely inferred from the fact that the best previous shooting in any match has not exceeded in this, and yet there is a considerable margin between its record and absolute perfection. The precision already attained at, however, is such that but one of the 540 shots fired at Dollymount would have missed a man, the ranges being 800, 900, and 1,000 yards.

The first flat contains finishing room, washing machine, rotary finishing mill, set of fulling stocks, rig for napping cloth, steam boiler for coloring and other purposes. The second flat contains a spooler and warper, four broad looms and other machinery. The third flat, two jacks having 450 spindles, reel, double and twisted and a set of 40 inch cars. The fourth flat is used for storing purposes, principally. Under new and expert management the factory has outdone upon a career of prosperity.

TELEGRAPH NOTES FOR THE WEEK

London, July 3.—A despatch from Paris reports that at Beziers, in the Department of Hérault, there is considerable agitation against the monastic orders. On Thursday a deputation of Republicans waited on the Sub-Prefect to demand the expulsion of the Franciscan Brothers, and in the evening took possession of the monastery, some entering the house. The military ultimately dispersed the crowd. In Lyons also the Public Prosecutors, recently appointed in the place of those who resigned, entered the Court of Appeal to take the oath of office, all the numbers of the Bar immediately quitted the court in a body. There was a similar scene on July 5.—A Victoria despatch says on Saturday a crowd assembled at Wellington to celebrate a series of athletic sports. Thomas Hall, boatman of the ship Maggie E. Zed, created a disturbance, and was chained to a post in the stable of the hall, but before the chain could be put on he escaped, and was rescued by the police. The victim was burned alive before they could get to him. On Monday, July 10.—Montenegro affairs will be more difficult than that of Greece. Greece has the advantage of the Ambassador's confidence from Sir Alfred Sandson's Oriental Secretary, and he is reported to have taken Embassy's confidence from the Sultan. The quarrel causes much commotion, and it is believed that Sandson will shortly quit his post. War still retains great influence with the Sultan. An order has been received at the Imperial gun factory to supply immediately 150,000 shot and shells for the guns.
