would be going on with tomorrow in the case of the completion of this legislation. Perhaps it would be convenient for some hon. members if the house leader would also put on the record again the order of the departments whose estimates would be taken.

**Mr. Churchill:** I shall be glad to do that, Mr. Speaker. Tomorrow this debate will continue. If brought to a conclusion we might find it possible to deal with the report of the committee on rules and procedures. I think that report might become available later tomorrow.

**Mr. Pickersgill:** If I may be permitted to interrupt, does the house leader think it would be quite reasonable to ask hon. members to deal with the report affecting our rules before all hon. members have had time to read and consider the report. I think it

would be far better to follow the ordinary rules.

**Mr. Churchill:** I just throw it out as a suggestion. As the hon. member knows the proposals are advanced as an experiment. It was just a suggestion.

On Wednesday we will proceed with the estimates of the following departments in the order in which I shall name them: northern affairs, secretary of state, defence production, legislation and labour. That leaves us with only four departments—defence, trade and commerce, finance and privy council—to complete the business of the session although those departments will not necessarily be taken up in that order.

It being five minutes past eleven o'clock the house adjourned, without question put, pursuant to special order.

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
