MEDICARE—DISCUSSION WITH PROVINCES
BEFORE ESTABLISHING PRIORITIES

On the orders of the day:

Hon. J. W. Monteith (Perth): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct a question to the Minister of Finance. In the light of the concern of the provinces over the cost of medicare, will the minister review medicare proposals with the provinces before establishing priorities, as mentioned in his speech last evening?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, I would think a question of this kind which relates to government policy in general should be directed to the Prime Minister rather than the Minister of Finance. I can assure the hon. member that all expenditure programs are under very careful review. I shall take into account his suggestion that we should consult with the provinces.

#### NATIONAL DEFENCE

NATO—PROPOSED PLACING OF NUCLEAR MINES ON TURKISH BORDER

On the orders of the day:

Mr. David Lewis (York South): Mr. Speaker, I have a question I wished to address to either the Prime Minister or the Secretary of State for External Affairs, neither of whom is in his seat. Perhaps one of the parliamentary secretaries will draw this question to the attention of one or the other of them for answer tomorrow.

In view of reports that the nuclear planning group of NATO, of which Canada is presently a member, met in Ankara last Friday and debated a Turkish proposal for nuclear mines to be laid on the eastern border of Turkey with the Soviet union, can the Prime Minister or the Secretary of State for External Affairs inform the house what position the Minister of National Defence, who was our representative in that group at this meeting, took on behalf of Canada in respect of this proposal? May we also have the assurance that Canada will vigorously oppose this 27053—1743

dangerous proposal, since it is clearly against the spirit of the non-proliferation policy which Canada has supported?

Hon. Paul Hellyer (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, I will be glad to draw this question to the attention of the Prime Minister.
