

In the preceding form blank space is left where the name of the invited person must be written. Here is another form which is very popular:

*Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Evans  
request your presence  
at the marriage of their daughter*

*Dorothy May,  
to*

*Mr. Ernest A. Morrison,  
On Wednesday evening, June thirteenth,  
Nineteen hundred and three,  
at eight o'clock,  
First Baptist Church,  
Montreal.*

These two forms are also correct for a home wedding by omitting the name of the church and inserting the street address.

It is also correct to say :

*request the pleasure of your company*

instead of

*request your presence*

should you prefer it that way.
