Rev. Dr. A. S. Grant was given a great ovation when he rose to present the report of the home mission board before the General Assembly, and three thousand visiting Presbyterians at Massey Hall last night. "Eminently satisfactory" was the

verdict of the board respecting the experiment of unifying the various home mission committees, and placing ten district superintendents in charge of the various fields. There were now 1108 augmented charges and mission fields. While immigrants poured into Canada at the rate of over a thousand a day, the home mission committee must continue to open up new work.
