

Well-Known English Chop House Has Undergone Complete Remodeling.

Today the Hotel Teck, formerly the English Chop House, 30 King street west, is to make its bow to the public as a high-class restaurant and buffet, which for costly fittings and up-to-date equipment will challenge comparison with anything in the city.

Under the direction of C. E. Hoshal, manager, the well-known hostelry has undergone complete remodeling from top to bottom, and those who take advantage of the invitation to inspect will find an establishment which leaves nothing to be desired in the way of completeness. The ground floor interior leading back to the business men's buffet has been walled with Breche Pavonize Italian marble in a manner which gives the whole interior a most unique and dignified appearance.

The buffet itself is decorated in the Elizabethan style with Jacobean furniture and with subdued lighting makes a very attractive and inviting room. The ground floor, however, is only 12:12 and the room is very large and airy. The interior decoration is carried out in mahogany and red and white enamel, which adds quite a bright touch of cheer.
