We have been asked by several subscribers to attempt to forecast the United Kingdom's supplies in the next four months, say from April 1 to July 31, the impression being that the present large quantity adoat must mean increasing stocks in the United Kingdom. There is no doubt that the supplies during the next four months will be in excess of our requirements, but the extent of that excess is doubtful, and depends largely upon the weather conditions and the crop prospects. We attempt to forecast the supplies during the next four months, the result being an excess of about 1,000,000 quarters, which would make the port stocks on Aug. 1 about 2,500,000 quarters—not an excessive figure under the circumstances, but one rather above the average of the past few years; as a matter of fact, our present stocks in first hands (1,450,000 quarters on April 1) stand in need of replemishing, and the addition of a million quarters thereto in the next four months would be nothing out of the common, and would, indeed, be far below the addition which was made in the corresponding period last year.
