**NO SERIOUS ACCIDENTS MARK MOUNTAIN'S HOLIDAY**

**Fire Destroys Mountain Home of Mr. Hopper—Thieves Get Away With Jewelry.**

Hamilton, Aug. 7.—(Special)—Civic holiday passed off very quietly in this city. A great many strangers were in the city. Many of them came from Toronto by the boats, which had a busy day in the various parks. The steam railroads and electric lines also carried many passengers to and from the city. The day passed without any mishap of a serious nature.

A colored man named Groat pulled a knife on some people on King William street to-night because they objected to him throwing a chair which was on the sidewalk into the middle of the road, smashing the police who called and Groat was locked up.

**Mountain Home Burned.**

The home of Mr. Hopper on the mountain, at the head of Wellington street, was completely destroyed along with its contents to-night by fire. There was a garden party at the house and while sitting on the lawn some of the party saw fire in the woods. The fire had gained considerable headway and as there was no means at hand to fight it they had to stand helplessly by and watch it burn to the ground. The house was a double frame and was the old Burney homestead. It was valued at about \$1800 and was not insured.

**House Broken Into.**

Mrs. John Perry of the Royal Oak Hotel, Spycorn's Corners, reported to the police that her house was broken into while she was in the city yesterday. Three watches, some small articles of jewelry and 50 cents in money were stolen. The police recovered the watches since, but the contents of the housebreak has been found.

**MURDERED FOR HIS MONEY**  
**FOUR COMRADES DISAPPEAR**

**Suspicion That Finlander Found in Water Was Slain is Strengthened—Second Body is Found.**

St. John's, Que., Aug. 7.—Joseph Barsalou this morning in the Lower woods, just outside the town limits, came across the corpse of a man. The man's face is much disfigured. It is stated the body is that of a man who was called at Lovner's Thursday and asked for a drink of water.

With regard to the man found in the river yesterday and who is now said to be a Finlander, there are grave suspicions of foul play. It is reported that five men of the same nationality left their boarding house after supper Saturday evening and only four returned last in the night. In addition to the bruises on the victim's head is the fact that no water was found on his stomach.

Two of the party left for Montreal yesterday morning and the two others have disappeared since the finding of the body. They viewed the corpse at the morgue yesterday and denied having any knowledge of the man. There was no money found on his person, although he received \$150 on Saturday.

**DAZZED BY LIGHTNING BOLT**  
**GRAYS AND SAVES STOCK**

**Farmer Has Narrow Escape From Death in Barn Burned During Storm.**

Bowmanville, Aug. 7.—(Special)—Leslie Short of Foley escaped a miraculous death Sunday morning, when his barns and outbuildings were struck by lightning during a storm. He was in the building at the time and was rendered unconscious by the shock, which paralyzed the lower part of his body. When he regained partial consciousness he crawled on his hands and knees and released a cow and calf, and then crawled to the house.

All his buildings, with 40 tons of hay, 25 pigs, cream separator and about 100 bushels of barley, were burned.

The buildings and contents were partly insured.

**KILLED BY PITCHED BALL.**

London, Aug. 7.—(Special)—While playing ball this afternoon at Tecumseh Park, Doty Webb of the Blue Label team, an outfielder, received fatal injuries. He was at the bat and was struck on the left temple by a pitched ball. He recovered sufficiently to return home, but later lapsed into unconsciousness and succumbed to complications of the brain.

**TWO SISTERS—DROWN.**

St. Hyacinthe, Que., Aug. 7.—Three young girls, Colombe, Marie and Genevieve of St. Hyacinthe, and a young man named Alphonse Scotts, were about to cross the Yamaska River in a boat last night, when they discovered that the boat was leaking badly. The craft and two of the girls, named Anna and Laura, aged 17 and 14, respectively, went down in the water before assistance could reach them. The other sister, named Amosa, aged 9, and the young man, Scotts, clinging to the boat, which was upside down, till they were rescued by some canoes in the vicinity. The two being clasped in each other's arms as they most likely went down.

**Houses Burned.**

Brookville, Aug. 6.—During a severe thunderstorm this morning lightning struck a house owned by E. G. Galt, a large portion of the roof and one end of the house was torn away. The inmates were shocked, but not injured.

A farmhouse on the Prescott road, a few miles from here, occupied by M. Powers, is reported to have been struck and burned.

**RECEPTION FOR SERGT. CROWE.**

Guelph, Aug. 7.—(Special)—Sergeant Charles R. Crowe returned today from London, Ontario, where he was met by a public reception and was made the recipient of a handsomely prepared address.

Sergeant Crowe carried off the largest individual prize winnings among all the contestants in the 1500 train by Mayor's reception committee, Col. A. H. Macdonald, Ald. Newstead, J. P.
